OLD ROSEBUD ONE THAT CAME BACK BY H. C. HAMILTON. (United Press Staff Correspondent.) New York, July 28.—They say they never come back, but Old Rosebud did. He did it so effectively he has been handicapped at the top in several races this year and is recognized as one of the best horses on the American turf. Old Rosebud's trainers tell an interesting story of his comeback. A strained tendon, which bowed the horse's left leg first took him out of training and he was out for a year before he again attempted to run. The same old malady came back. Then the famous winner of the Kentucky Derby several years ago was taken to Kentucky, where he was allowed to roam at will over a huge farm. Then he went to Texas. Flies and gnats were very bad. Associating with the draft horses and other stock on this Texas ranch, Old Rosebud followed them when they went to a stream and stood all day long, at times, to "escape the insects." "I believe the water cure just as much responsible for the comeback as anything I did," his trainer declared.

Brakeman Arrested. Huntington, July 28.—(Special)—Cromwell Bird, a brakeman on the Oregon Short Line, was arrested here Wednesday night by City Marshal Catherine at the request of Chief of Police Sutherland of Pocatello, Idaho, who reported that Bird was wanted at Pocatello on the charge of forging the payee's name to a United States postal money order and cashing it. The amount was stated at about \$40.

Spruce Helps Win War. Seattle, Wash., July 28.—(United Press)—Pacific northwest spruce may be the deciding factor in the great world war. Military experts say the war will be won in the air, and many mills throughout Oregon and Washington today are cutting spruce for

the government. Spruce demands a high price and only the best stock can be used for airplanes. Five mills in the Coos Bay district in southwestern Oregon are cutting spruce alone.

Portland Boy Puzzle. Portland, Ore., July 28.—(United Press)—Lincoln Davies, a former Portland school boy, back in Portland today with an honorable discharge after 13 months in the Canadian army, is a puzzle to American troopers.

Davies wears a Canadian uniform, which is different in many ways from the regulation United States regalia, and on his arms are chevrons—signifying his rank as corporal.

Davies walks down a Portland street, the center of puzzled and admiring eyes. American soldiers look at his uniform, wonder what new kind of a fighting man he may be, and then, just to make sure, they usually salute.

"I was walking down the street the other day," Davies said today, "and I saw an American soldier with a girl on each arm coming down the street. He looked at me, and evidently was unable to figure out just what kind of a soldier I was. He let loose of his two girls and saluted and then he remembered he had a cigar in his mouth. He hurriedly pulled it out, his confusion showing plainly on his face."

Davies was injured in an accident in Eastern Canada just as his unit of field artillery was preparing to go to Europe.

Labor Tests Ordinance. Portland, Ore., July 28.—(United Press)—Money raised at the picnic of organized labor at Crystal Lake park tomorrow will be used to test the constitutionality of the anti-conspiracy ordinance recently adopted here. All labor organizations connected with the central labor council will be represented. Tomorrow's program includes a tug of war, baseball game and other athletic contests, swimming, speech-making and dancing.
