Beefsteak Pie

Cut 2 pounds of meat from the round or flank into pieces 1 inch square. Sprinkle with 1 tablespoon of flour, 1 tablespoon of parsley and 1 onion chopped fine, and brown thoroughly in 2 tablespoons of butter. Remove to a deep baking dish, pour a cup of hot water or stock into the pan in which the meat was browned, thoroughly scrape up all rich meat juices, let come to boiling point, and pour over the meat in the baking dish. Bake three quarters of an hour, then cover with a crust made as follows:

Remove all membrane from 1-4 pound of suet, chop fine, and add to it gradually 1 cup of flour. Add 1-4 teaspoon of salt and enough ice water to moisten. Knead for a moment then roll out into a sheet large enough to cover the top of the baking dish. Make a hole in the center of the crust for the escape of the steam. Before covering the meat with the crust, season with 1 teaspoon of salt and a dash of pepper. Brush over the top of the crust with milk of beaten egg, and bake three quarters of an hour.

Chicken Marengo

Dress, clean and cut up a chicken for serving. Sprinkle with salt and pepper, dredge with flour and saute in hot salt pork fat, turning often to brown evenly. Remove to a stew pan and cover with tomato sauce; then allow to simmer slowly until the chicken is tender. Add one-half can of mushrooms cut in thin slices and continue cooking 5 minutes. Place the chicken on a hot platter and surround with the sauce. Garnish with sprigs of parsley. Serve with rice croquettes.

A Quick Dessert

Take a loaf of sponge cake—if it is a trifle stale that does not matter—and cut one rather thick slice for each person to be served. Arrange a slice on each dessert plate. Take a jar of preserved strawberries and put a part or all of it into a saucepan—the quantity must be decided by the number of persons to be served—and add to it enough cold water to make it pour easily. Heat but do not allow it to boil when ready to put the dessert on the table cover each piece of cake with the sauce. If desired, this might be thickened slightly with a little flour. Any kind of preserved fruit might be substituted for the strawberries; cherries would be particularly good.

Chicken Loaf, With Spiced Jelly

Dress and remove the meat from the bones of a 5-pound fowl. Add 1-2 pounds of lean veal and 1 pound of fresh pork with some fat. Pass through the meat chopper twice. Add 6 soda crackers rolled fine, 2 well-beaten eggs, 2 finely chopped priments, 1 cup of pecan nut meats broken into bits; then season well with salt and black pepper. Moisten with cream sauce or Bechamel sauce and add 1-4 teaspoon of mace. With the hands mix well and shape into an oblong loaf. Arrange in a dripping pan

over thin slices of fat salt pork. Cover the top also with thin slices. Bake 15 minutes in a hot oven, reduce the heat and cook slowly for two hours, basting often. Serve cold, thinly sliced and garnished with spiced jelly.

ADVISES EXEMPTION OF FARM HANDS

St. Paul, July 30.—(United Press)—Exemption of farmhands for a year was advocated by Assistant Secretary of Agricultural Carl Vrooman, who passed through here today on his way to Washington. "I think the farmers will see it as their duty to take new men, not of the draft age, and train them to take the places of the young men of the farms," Vrooman declared; "but in order that they may have a chance to do this, I have favored exemption of farmers' sons and other help on the farm for the first year."
