HOW THE BATTLE LINES RUN.**Western Front.**

ENGLAND: Holds the line from Lombartarde to Dixmude to Bixschoote, Zonnebeke, Klein Zillebeke, Hollebeke, Messines, Ploegsteert (all in Belgium) to Armentieres, Fromelies, Neuve Chapelle, LaBasse, Loos, Lievin, around the outskirts of Lens, Acheville, Oppy, Fampoux, Monchy, Cherisy, Bullecourt, Lagnicourt, Hermies, Gouzeaucourt, Villiers-Guislain, Epehy, Le Verguier. One small portion, in Belgium, is held by Belgian troops.

FRANCE: From around St. Quentin, to St. Simon, to around LaFere, Fresnes, Coucy, Neuville, Laffaux, Jouy, along the Chemin des Dames to Craonne, Berry-au-Bac, Courcy, Cernay, north of Rheims, around Beine, Nauroy, Moronvilliers, Auberive, Souain, to the Argonne north of St. Mancheville, and Varennes, to Mamalcourt, Vacherauville, Douaumont (north of Verdun), Damloup, Etain, Les Eparges, St. Mihiel, Oontamousson, through the Vosges to the Swiss border.

Macedonian Front.

Troops under General Serrail (France) and including units from the British, French, Italian, Russian, Serbian and Greek armies hold a line approximately west to east from Ochrida to Gobeoh to Karlis (north of Monastir) to Zovik, to Doiran and Lake Doiran.

Italian Front.

In the Trentino the lines have undergone no particular change in more than a year.

On the Isonzo and Carso, General Cadorna's offensive this spring advanced the Italian line to approximately this course: From the Isonzo east to Plava to Kuk, Vodice, Monte Santo, Grasnica, Tivoli, Saber (east of Gorizia) to Vertojba, San Grado, Volkovnjak, Fatti Hrib, Versie, east of Jamianoi, Selo, close to Hermada, and down past Timavo to the gulf. The lines are within twelve miles of Trieste.

Russian Fronts.

No change has occurred for a year on the Riga-Mitau front. The lines of battle in Rumania and the wooded Carpathians have also not been moved by either side.

On July 1 Russia started a great offensive which gained twelve or fifteen miles advance toward Lemberg, but this was swept back by July 23. On this date the line ran approximately from east Vila, around Lida and Novogrudok to Stolovitshi, Ganzevitchi, Plaskino, to Pinsk, then along the Rivers Pripet and Strumen to south of the River Sty to Dubno and Brody. In Galicia, they ran from Brody through Broezany and Tarnopol, thence down into the Carpathians and Rumania.

Southern Fronts.

In Palestine British troops hold a line from Gaza nearly to the Dead Sea, approximately 40 miles from Jaffa and Jerusalem, with only one gap around Beersheba.

In Mesopotamia, British troops have penetrated sixty miles beyond Bagdad nearly to Samarra and Khanikin. Further to the east is the Russian army, which has been quiescent since reported in the region of Kermanshah and Hamadan. One other Russian army, which has not reported in months, was established near Elzerum and Erzincan, Caucasasia.

**LETTER FROM TEXAS.**

Harry Walters Writes Home From Camp Kelley

Relatives of Harry Walters, at Camp Kelley, Texas, received a letter this week, saying: My military training at O. A. C. fitted me up for sergeant here and when this camp was first made it was some job to organize it and put it under military control. About 5,000 men with no idea of military life at all, were given to about 20 of us to handle.

It was a job alone to keep the western cowboys from knocking the block off a New York Yankee, or a Boston Bean Eater. But now, after finally convincing the Easterner that we have real cities, trains, autos and big mountains, rivers and husky men in the West are not all wild Indians, they have consented to eat at the same mess as we do without linen napkins and table cloths. Yet the Easterner has not a very vivid idea of the West. In fact they were not thoroughly convinced of the true western power until receiving a poke in the jaw. There are 150 men to the squadron and about 5,000 are organized into squadrons, nearly ready to be sent to the various training camps throughout the United States.

We were to go to Champaign, Ill., 5th of July, but because of change of captains we are still here and due to go to Belleville, Ill., 13 miles east of St. Louis, before August 1st.

Today I got my second promotion of the month. Am now a sergeant of the 1st class, which is next to the highest position an enlisted man can be promoted to. You understand this branch of service deals entirely with the flying machines of some description. My work deal with the assembling, repairing and up-keep of each plane. It is a peculiar and particular kind of work.

You can imagine how I sweated when I landed here from off the tops of the Rocky Mountains in Montana.

I have hopes of eating Xmas dinner in Paris, but don't know if I can get there that soon.
