ITALY AND THE WAR

British guns, fired by Canadians, aided the Italians in this great offensive and Allied warships in the gulf of Trieste bombarded the Austrian coast positions.

In Trentino, a successful offensive also gained ground for Cadorna's warriors. Official estimates now place the number of Austrian prisoners held in Italy at 155,000—and of these at least \$5,000 were taken in the spring offensives.

But while Italy has been advancing into Austria, she has been compelled gradually to abandon the hinterland of Tripolitania. Hostile Arab tribes in the interior, backed with German-Turkish money forced the retirement of the Italians to a thin line along the coast.

In Albania the Savoyan army now occupies a strip of territory between the Adriatic and the river Vojussa to the northwest. Fallona, facing Brindisi, is the principal Italian stronghold.

Italy's navy has netted or sunk in the year just past at least 40 Austrian and German submarines. British "drifters" have given valuable aid in this work. The Italian navy is just now co-operating effectively with British, Japanese and French squadrons in the Mediterranean to sweep the seas clear of enemy submarines. King Victor's sailors have given good

account of themselves in the one important naval engagement of the year for Italy—that off Cattaro—although they lost heavily.

The Italian flying corps, it is estimated, has dropped 75 enemy flyers in the year. It has carried out frequent raids over Austrian ports, including Trieste.

These achievements have cost Italy approximately \$48,845,200,000 in a year. Nearly \$4,000,000,000 of this was spent on the army and \$168,000,000 on the navy. The present monthly cost of the war is close to \$225,000,000. America's financial aid has been of great service in helping Italy to meet this tremendous strain.

The German submarine campaign has resulted in sky-rocketing living prices in Italy and in considerable discomfort. The situation, however, is far from serious. The cost of living is now up nearly 64 per cent from before the war. Coal is almost prohibitive. That for ships, at seaboard is around \$90 a ton. American shoes, formerly \$8 and \$10 cost more than \$15 now. Sugar, butter and flour are rarities. Meat is scarce. But the Italian people do not appear to be suffering in the least from their deprivations.

Admittedly like voices crying in the wilderness, the Vatican organs persist in their editorial campaigns for a speedy and just peace. Directly and through his Nuncios it is reported Pope Benedict has ceaselessly worked for a termination of hostilities.
