### PORTLAND MARKET LETTER WEEK ENDING AUGUST 4

The volume of business transacted in the Portland Union Stock Yards during the week ending August 4th, amounts to something more than 80 cars, distributed as follows:  
Cattle .....1016  
Hogs .....2426  
Sheep .....3956  
The general tone of the market has been looking upward throughout the week in all lines and sales have been prompt.

**Cattle.**  
A steady tone has continued throughout the week in the cattle pens, although the offering on the week's opening market was not as heavy as had found its way to the yards on previous weeks, the string has continued to come at a steady rate throughout the week and a large volume of business has passed through the yards without alteration in prices.

**Hogs.**  
There has been a very strong tone from day to day in the hog market in spite of the fact that the number of hogs entering on the market were considerably increased over last week's offerings. Opening the week with a near thousand volume the shippers have not allowed the string to fall below one-half that number for any one day, yet week's operations are drawing to a close with a strong demand and the bulk of the Friday offering passing the scales at \$15.58.

**Sheep.**  
The sheep market has been developing signs of strength throughout the week which resulted in the latter days of trading into a 25c to 50c raise in the lamb market. The week's business is closing with more than 1100 lambs presented at the yards for the final day to face an advanced price closing with the following quotations:  
Valley lambs .....\$11.00 to \$11.50  
Western lambs .....\$12.00 to \$12.75

**Birthday of Dr. Still.**  
Kirksville, Mo., Aug. 6.—(Special)—Dr. Andrew Taylor Still, the founder of Osteopathy, is eighty-nine years old today. The American Osteopathic Association which convenes at Columbus, Ohio, will dedicate the

day to appropriate ceremonies in his honor.  
When Dr. Still first proclaimed his theories in the seventies, they were received with little credence. When he enunciated such ideas as that disease in the bodily organs was often caused by vertebrae being slightly displaced, causing pressure upon the spinal nerves controlling the function of those organs and that the adjustment of the vertebrae would relieve the nerve interference and result in recovery of the diseased organs, he was ridiculed. Today, his theories have received a general acceptance and his system of practice accorded legal recognition by the various states. He is recognized as being one of humanity's benefactors.  
During the past year, funds have been contributed by prominent people from Canada and the United States for the erection of a statue of Dr. Still. This statue was recently unveiled at Kirksville, Missouri, the home of Dr. Still. It is of heroic proportions, and is the work of the noted sculptor, George Julian Zolnay. It represents the "Old Doctor", as he is affectionately called by his followers, as he is often seen, staff in hand, wearing soft, old-fashioned boots which he refuses to discard, tramping the oak covered hills about his home, getting in touch with "things as God made them."

**NEW YORK KNIGHTS FURNISH TWENTY AMBULANCE UNITS**  
Twenty ambulances for the American army in France is to be the outstanding feature of the war relief work undertaken by the New York chapter of the Knights of Columbus. Each of these ambulance units will be composed of five surgeons and eighty-six helpers, including nurses, a total of 1820 men and women. The entire outfit will also be provided with two motor trucks, one touring car and nineteen motorcycles. Ten of the ambulances, given by individual councils have already been provided, and before the end of July it is hoped to have others fully equipped and manned.


