PORTLAND MARKET LETTER

August 8

The arrival at the yards this morning were mostly in the stock and feeder classes, the same fairly good animals appeared in various quarters carrying a kill attractive to packers and butchers.

The cattle pens show 150 new arrivals. The hog sheds, show 250, and the sheep house 100. The market was steady throughout the day in all sections with no changes in the current prices. The offering changed hands at a steady movement and the yards were readily cleaned up today.

Ex-President Taft Ill

Clay Center, Kan., Aug. 9.—(Special)ial!—The condition of ex-president William H. Taft, who became ill here Monday, was announced by his physicians late today as improved. The physicians stated, however, that it was uncertain whether Mr. Taft would be able to resume his speaking schedule.

Mr. Taft was suddenly stricken Monday following a speaking engagement. The cause of the indisposition was said to be stomach trouble.

German Is Arrested

Honolulu, T. H., July 31.—(By Mail)—Max Webber, a German time-keeper on a plantation on the island of Maui, has been placed under arrest by Federal officers who had been trailing him for some days. In Webber's possession was found a bottle labeled "poison."

A chemical and bacteriological analysis of its contents was ordered. There have been rumors of a plot to destroy cattle by scattering anthrax germs.

STATE: Aug. 1 forecast, 8,400,000 bushels; production last year (December estimate), 13,340,000 bushels. UNITED STATES: Aug. 1 forecast 417,000,000 bushels; production

last year (December estimate), 481,744,000 bushels.

Spring Wheat

STATE: Aug. 1 forecast, 3,920,000 bushels; production last year (December estimate), 6,210,000 bushels. UNITED STATES: Aug. 1 forecast, 236,000,000 bushels; production last year (December estimate), 158,142,000.

Oats.

STATE: Aug. 1 forecast, 10,600,000 bushels; production last year (December estimate), 17,280,000 bushels.

UNITED STATES: Aug. 1 forecast, 1,460,000,000 bushels; production last year (December estimate), 1,251,992,000 bushels.

Barley

STATE: Aug. 1 forecast, 4,190,000 bushels; production last year (December estimate), 5,390,000 bushels.

Potatoes
