Then one finds the scenes shifting back to modern Egypt and sees the automobiles, steam boats, telephones and other conveniences of today looking somehow oddly out of place in that land of mystery and enchantment. But the skilful handling of the transition is so carefully effected that this only enhances the contrast and makes the whole more perfect, leading up as it does, to the final reunion and happiness of the lovers, separated by circumstances through so many centuries.

Lures of Gold Brick Schemes For the Small Investors.

Will persons with money never learn how to take care of it? Will they never guard themselves against the horde of tricksters who make a business of taking advantage of the credulous and especially of credulous women?

Bear in mind that no one will make money for you when he can make it for himself. If he offers to give you the key to wealth, suspect him, for such keys are kept by their possessors and are not given away to strangers.

The postoffice a year or two ago showed that over \$150,000,000 had been lost by persons who listened to the gold brick schemes, but the game still goes on despite the vigilance of the postoffice department and the passage of protective measures, known as "blinky laws," by many states.

Will the people never learn to discount the alluring literature which these shysters send out and which is written for them by some of the sharpest and brightest writers of our day, whose services can be easily obtained for a few dollars?

I advise my readers who receive these tempting propositions to send them at once to the postmaster general at Washington for investigation. That is the business of the postoffice department, and it will be only too happy to take up such matters.

Small investors are particularly the victims of these bunco schemes, for the false notion prevails that a man or woman with a small amount of money cannot buy high class investment securities such as successful investors prefer. This is erroneous. An investment can now be made in the best of paying securities with as small an amount as \$10 through the partial payment plan, which is readily understood, though the term may sound formidable.—Leslie's Weekly.

A LITTLE PIECE OF LEAD.

The Costliest Thing This World of Ours Has Ever Known.

Just think of one small piece of lead, probably weighing less than an ounce, that cost the world some \$100,000,000,000 in money, probably \$100,000,000,000 in property, more than 11,000,000 lives and individual suffering and loss impossible of computation—a bit of lead that embroiled in war Germany, Austria-Hungary, Britain, France, Belgium, the United States, Turkey, Siberia, Italy, Montenegro, Roumania, Bulgaria, Albania, Egypt, Canada, Australia, China, Japan, South Africa, India and Russia and brought every other nation to the brink of internal trouble or outward disaster, the consequences of which are being felt by every human being, civilized or uncivilized, white, black, yellow or brown!

That small piece of lead was fired from a pistol in the hands of a crack-brained youth of Servian nativity into the body of the heir to the Austrian throne. The troubles arising from this mad act and its punishment set fire to the powder trains in Europe and led to hostile act after hostile act and finally and suddenly to open war in 1914.

That little piece of lead should be preserved as a memorial to all future generations and as the costliest thing mankind has ever known. It would become the greatest silent teacher the world has ever seen. It would teach restraint for the weak minded and violent; it would teach the importance of minor acts and things; it would teach peace as no costly monument, no book of horrors, no painting of tragedy could ever teach it.—Detroit Free Press.

OUR RED CROSS TO USE DOGS.

Training School to Be Set Up Near Paris.

America's dogs will "do their bit" in the war. A number of them, specially fitted for Red Cross work, are already in France.

The American army sanitary experts have authorized the American Red Cross to establish immediately a dog training school near Paris. The dogs will be trained as French Red Cross dogs are, to find American wounded on the field, particularly over terrain that is broken or wooded. A number of expert American dog handlers are already in France and will begin the work at once with a few of the American dogs already received. More are said to be on the way, and the American training station will likewise receive a number of French dogs.

According to the plan of the Red Cross dog experts, three trained dogs will be attached to each Red Cross ambulance unit.

NEW MARCHING SONG FOR OUR ARMY IN FRANCE

"Over the Sea to Germany" Was Composed by Men on the Way Over.

The American troops in France have a new marching song—"Over the Sea to Germany."

The music was composed by Clarence Gridley, a son of the famous Captain Gridley of Manila Bay, and the words were written on the way over by John Erb, commissary clerk on one of the transports. The chorus goes: Goodby, dear old Yankee land. Hello, France!

NIAGARA FOR EAST RIVER.

Miniature Cataract to Be Feature of New Aqueduct Celebration.

Beginning on Columbus day and continuing till the evening of Oct. 14 all sorts of spectacular things are going to take place to celebrate the completion of the Catskill aqueduct, the new water system for New York city.

One of the features of the celebration is to be a sort of mimic Niagara in the East river. A high pressure pipe is to be laid across the edge of one of the bridges. Holes are to be punched at intervals in the pipe in such a way that the water can fall directly to the river below. The "cataract" will be illuminated in the evening. River traffic will be suspended temporarily if necessary.

The ceremony of "delivering the water to the city" will take place at the city hall on Columbus day. Mayor Mitchell will preside, and former Mayor McClellan, who broke ground for the aqueduct ten years ago, will be the guest of honor. A fountain designed by MacMonnies and Franklin Hastings, which is the gift of Mrs. Angelina Crane, will be unveiled at the city hall plaza. A cornerstone of another fountain in Central park will be laid.

On the following days there will be parades, dinners, pageants and musical festivals in churches and schools.

PRISONERS PATRIOTIC.

All Except Two in Elmsford Jail Eager to Enlist.

Thirty-five out of thirty-seven inmates of military conscription age in the new Westchester (N. Y.) county penitentiary de luxe in Elmsford, of which V. Everit Macy, commissioner of correction, is head, have offered to go to war. They prefer the trenches to a life of comparative ease in the world's newest and most luxurious jail.

"They are all eager to enlist," said Warden Calvin Derrick, "except two who have wives and small children. These are the only ones who made any claim for exemption at the registration."

Nearly all the eligibles are serving time for misdemeanors and therefore are not barred from army duty. Mr. Derrick is highly pleased with the patriotic spirit of his charges and concluded, "We have no slackers." So far 120 inmates have been received at the penitentiary, which is only partly completed.
