law. As the President signed the measure this afternoon, the federal trade commission reported to Hoover of an attempt to corner the output of the Pacific coast tomato canneries. This is one of the first results of the commission's food price investigation.

The hope to make nearly ten million dollars excess profits in army contracts was declared to be back of the efforts to corner the coast tomato pack.

Hoover and the President conferred over the enforcement of the bill this afternoon.

Food control throughout the country will probably be ordered late today.
