London, July 20.—(By Mail)—One lost tooth and one blackened eye are the total war-time casualties of the 560 police-women who have helped to release 'harness' Bobbies for the trenches. The tooth was punched out during a slight misunderstanding with a lady prisoner. Another minor difference of opinion between arrestee and arrestee was climaxed by an unladylike wallop in the eye.

Cecil Chapman, a police official, today explained that the police-women must have an unusual fund of tact to make up for her lack of brawn. One police-woman, he said, was shocked by the hugging of a young soldier and a girl in public. She attempted an arrest but learned that as the pair were engaged they had a perfect right to borrow and pay back kisses any time they pleased.

So the soldier had the police-woman arrested for interfering.
