ALL BUT SHOW CATTLE SHOULD BE DEHORNED

P. H. SPILLMAN, COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT, SAYS HORNS ARE MENACE

I quote in part a market letter sent out by the Benson Commission Co. of Portland which brings out quite clearly why all cattle with the exception of show animals should be dehorned, as the ultimate end of the greater portion of cattle is the shambles.

"We desire again to call the attention of stock growers the importance of dehorning cattle. It is an every day occurrence that cattle are more or less damaged by being gored by one another. It is especially so with cows, they being more vicious than steers. It is not an uncommon occurrence that we have to sell an animal subject to post mortem inspection on account of horn bruises, and if not sold subject, the buyers will invariably bid lower on account of bruises."

Many of our stock men dehorn but there are still too many that do not. Two bunches of cattle of exactly the same quality but one being dehorned and the other not will always see the dehorned get the best price of the two. I am told that horned cattle are getting to be an unusual sight on the middle western markets, and that horned cattle are distinctly discriminated against. In fact when the Union Experiment Station sent three carloads of fat cattle to Kansas City two years ago this month, the buyers in the yards referred to them as "those horned cattle" and though in fine shape and topping the market for grass cattle, they did not bring what they would have had they been dehorned. All cattle now fed at the Experiment Station are dehorned before being put on feed. They have found that cattle feed more quietly

and all have a better chance to get their share and the removal of the horns "tames down" some of the more unruly ones when it comes to handling them.

This applies as well to the dairy cow as to the beef cattle. Dairy cattle can be more readily handled and cattle feed together much better under all conditions where they are without horns. In the winter they can be kept in sheds or in sheltered places to better advantage as only about one half or two thirds as much room will be required to shelter them when loose. The loss of dairy cattle going each other when going in and out of stables though not a great factor however often cause serious injury or loss of an animal. Further, many injuries have resulted to parties being stuck by the horn of a dairy cow particularly when they are being tied in at night or being turned loose often milking, this being especially true during "fly time." Then there is the vicious animal I only recently saw a cow that had a board hung over her eyes for one of two reasons she was either vicious or a "fence jumper" she also had a set of horns, if vicious she was absolutely dangerous. A bull with horns is a good thing to keep clear off, however in the case of range cattle all the bulls on a given range or in a pasture should be either dehorned or all have their horns, otherwise the horned one may seriously injure those not furnished with a couple of "bayonets."

There is no place for the horn on other than show cattle from the family pet to the wildest range steer. PAUL H. SPILLMAN, County Agricultural Agent.
