HOLT'S NEW POSITION

(Continued from Page One)

acting as State Health Officer in the place of Dr. David N. Roberg, who left Portland Friday to take up Army medical work in San Francisco.

Dr. Roberg left with an indefinite leave of absence as State Health Officer. It was supposed that the Board of Health naturally would select his acting successor at a regular meeting.

To their astonishment, Dr. Robert J. Marsh, Dr. M. E. Marcellus and Dr. H. E. Clay, of the board, who had expected to have a vote on filling the temporary vacancy, were informed yesterday that Dr. Holt is filling Dr. Roberg's place.

They were informed by Dr. Holt himself, who broke the news none too gently.

Dr. Holt Keeps Keys.

"I have the keys of the office, and the job," commented Dr. Holt. "I may be out next week, but I am in now, and possession is nine points of the law, you know."

"You fellows," he added, in the course of a fairly prolonged discussion in which the stunned members of the board took only a minor part, "don't want to fight me or kick up a racket, and I'll treat you right."

Other fragments of the conversation as they were reported yesterday by the doctors, were equally interesting.

Just how Dr. Holt obtained possession of the job and the keys to the office, which carry with them a salary of \$4000 a year, is something of a mystery.

The coup is understood to have been engineered through a secret agreement between Dr. C. T. Bacon, of La Grande; Dr. A. C. Seely, of Roseburg, and Dr. A. C. Smith, of Portland, the other three members of the board, and Dr. Roberg, to the effect that Dr. Roberg should quietly turn over the office to Dr. Holt when he went to San Francisco.

The man at the throttle is understood to have been Dr. C. T. Bacon, of La Grande. Dr. Bacon is a member of the district draft exemption board which has headquarters at La Grande. He was in Portland early this week in connection with business of the district board.

Arrival Here Recent

Dr. Holt came to Portland a few weeks ago from La Grande, following his resignation as Major and commanding officer of the First Field Hospital Company, at La Grande. He

formed the company, which is composed of La Grande young men, but then resigned from it.

Dr. Robert J. Marsh, one of the members of the State Board of Health, said last night that Dr. Holt seemingly was in possession of the office and the job.

"If he ever was appointed at a meeting of the State Board of Health I certainly was not notified of the matter," he said. "The circumstances are rather peculiar, to say the least."

"I had supposed that the appointment of an acting state health officer to succeed Dr. Roberg would be made in due time at a regular meeting of the State Board of Health."

"To say that I was surprised to learn that Dr. Holt had succeeded Dr. Roberg without the knowledge of three of the six members of the board would be to put it rather mildly. Personally, I have nothing against Dr. Holt, but I feel that a man of demonstrated ability and experience should be named, and the appointment should certainly be made at a full meeting of the board."

Surprise Is Expressed

Dr. M. E. Marcellus, who is Major and chief medical officer of the Third Oregon Infantry, had likewise not been notified of any meeting of the board to select an acting health officer. He, too, expressed much surprise at Dr. Holt's announcement that he was the acting health officer.

Dr. Marcellus, Dr. Marsh and Dr. H. E. Clay, of Salem, the other of the three board members who were not notified, are understood to favor the appointment of Dr. E. P. Geary, ex-county physician of Multnomah County, and a doctor of much experience and demonstrated ability in health and sanitation work.

Dr. Bacon says the appointment of Holt was made by Dr. Roberg at a salary of \$2000, on authority of the Chairman of the Board of Health to continue until the regular meeting in September.

BISHOP BLACK VISITS SCOUT CAMP

Bishop Charles J. Black returned last night from his trip up Catherine Creek where he went Monday morning with Sec. King of the Y. M. C. A. to locate the Y. M. C. A. boys and the M. I. A. Boy Scouts for their weeks' hike. They reached camp about 7:30 a. m. He left them in one of the choicest places for camping in the mountains and in solid comfort. There is plenty of shade and good water, both for swimming and fishing; and also plenty of grass to help keep every thing clean.

Bishop Black desires to say to the mothers of the boys that they need have no fear for their boys, nor lose a moment's sleep on their account; nor take upon themselves any trouble for them as the boys are in the best of hands under Sec. King of the Y. M. C. A. Mr. King had the entire confidence of the boys and they obeyed the order and discipline of the camp with promptness and pleasure. He further noticed that Mr. King's rules and regulations gave the boys something to do that was of interest to each and occupied every moment of the time. After arriving at camp all hands were detailed to pitch tents, clean up the rubbish, and prepare a place for the kitchen, and locate places for the beds and campfire. These things accomplished they were turned loose to climb the hills and have a generally good time until 11:00 a. m. when came the call to lunch. They then rested until 2:00 p. m. when they went swimming. It was wonderful to witness the boys building a dam to make a swimming place. It reminded the Bishop of the early days when he used to watch the beavers building their dams for some such purpose. The boys certainly did a good piece of work. After bathing they all went fishing but were instructed by Mr. King before going, to be in camp at 7:00 p. m. sharp. Returning promptly they surrounded a large bonfire and held a quite little service for about one hour Bishop Black being called upon, addressed the boys at the close of which, Mr. King invoked the blessing of the Lord upon the camp and upon the boys. They were dismissed to go to bed, but some of the boys asking for Bishop Black to tell them stories of his early life as a cowboy and old time stage driver, they were called back and entertained with some of his early day experiences until about 9 o'clock when taps were sounded for bed in earnest.

After their strenuous day most of the boys slept soundly but a few of the livelier spirits started a pillow fight; the attacking and the attacked forces built a fort between them and went at it. For this extra good time they were penalized the next morning; the attacking force were allowed to clean up the camp after breakfast; the attacked were permitted to bring the wood for the kitchen fire; while four others were detailed to prepare the wood for the bonfire.

The Bishop desired to stay all week but press of other things forced him home. He endorses this movement for our boys most heartily and feels that the splendid response of our business men in getting the boys to their camp is worthy of the greatest commendation. And last, but not least, he was impressed by the kindly admonitions to the boys by Sec. King, that no denominational feelings should be shown but all should play and work in perfect harmony as one large family. If there should be any such it must be eliminated and a truly Christian spirit be shown by each one to each and every
