HERO OF FRENCH ARMY

to bring back the body in full daylight. The only possible protection that could be offered him was for the French machinegun operators to keep the dead bodies constantly covered with a barrage fire so that at least the Germans would not be able to creep out of their trenches and engage a hand-to-hand fight with the rescuer.
Accompanied by a soldier named Verdier who also volunteered for the task, Garandeau left the French trenches being obliged first to cut his

way through the French barbed-wire entanglements with nippers before reaching the open space of No-Man's-Land. By crawling on his face and taking advantage of all natural cover Garandeau was able to keep out of the range of the Germans who could neither fire at him or hurl grenades without exposing themselves to the deadly machinegun barrage with which the French were covering his worm-like progress.
Within an hour Garandeau, after reaching the body of Seve and tying it to his leg, had successfully dragged it back into the French line.
Inspired by his exploits volunteers immediately came forward and insisted on being allowed to go after the body of Ollmo in the same manner. Sergeant Crete and three soldiers were finally granted permission and before 8 in the evening they too returned to the French trenches dragging the other body tied to their legs.
Simultaneously with the decoration of Garandeau today with the Legion of Honor, the sergeant and soldiers who participated in the exploit received also the Croix de Guerre.

vision are being selected from the officers training camps and will be sent to France and to places in this country as soon as trained.
"Every company of American soldiers, everywhere," said General McCain, "will be accompanied by one or more of these men regularly stationed with it and part of whose job will be to know every man in the company."
"This man will report to the regimental Statistical Division which will be specially charged with the preparation and forwarding of casualty lists and data as to wounded and seriously ill.
"Information will likewise be reported as to all civilians accredited with the army.
"The organization will finally be completed by having a regimental section with each regiment. This will be in charge of the regular adjutant, assisted by the chaplain."
General McCain wishes all Sammys their relatives and friends to make full use of this secretariat division. Word can be gotten home, he feels, more expeditiously by the Sammy, through one of the division's form postcards than by any other means except expensive cable.
These post-cards are official and do not have to be delayed for censoring. If unable to write himself, his statistical field secretary will gladly do it for the Sammy.

FAMOUS KILTIES SEEK RECRUITS IN THE BUSY STREETS OF CHICAGO

UNIQUE UNIFORMS in the UNITED STATES

Kilties from the Forty-eighth Highlanders, the Scotch Canadian regiment of Toronto, Ontario, which has earned enduring fame for its part in the war, are marching the streets of Chicago this week, as part of the drive for recruits for the Allied armies which has been organized and carried through by Colonel John S. Dennis, commanding the Western Division, British Recruiting Mission, with the cooperation of Captain Franklin R. Kenny, U. S. A., in charge of recruiting for the Chicago district.
Two hundred Highlanders with their regimental band and their pipers parade the streets every day, and the "skirl" of the pipes is heard above the din of the "1" and the traffic cop's whistle. It is only part of the program, however, to stir enthusiasm and bring recruits to the recruiting stations. The Forty-eighth Highlanders have been in the war from the very beginning, going overseas as the Fifteenth Canadian battalion in the First Division, and fighting through St. Julien, Festubert, Courcellette, the Somme, and Vimy Ridge. Since the British Recruiting Mission opened western headquarters in Chicago, a number of Chicago men have joined this now famous regiment.
Britons and Canadians of military age resident in the United States are estimated by Colonel Dennis at 500,000. Until the British Mission was given permission by Congress to recruit in this country, it was necessary for a man to pay his own way to Canada for examination, with the chance of being rejected after he got there. More than 4,000 did go, but now a man may be examined and accepted at the nearest recruiting depot either of the United States army or of the British Mission, and his pay begins the day he "signs-on."
