New York, August 17.—Whether Ty Cobb is losing his title as king of baseball players isn't entirely demonstrated by his tremendous batting

average for the year. On a recent visit to New York Cobb, besides doing most of the baseball hammering, pulled a play or two that by sheer audacity simply stunned Yankees and spectators alike.

Ty had driven out a home run and then had singled. He went to second base, and when Veach reached first base the two of them worked a double steal, leaving Cobb on third and Veach on second.

On a ball hit to the infield by Burns Cobb sprinted for the plate and Veach for third. Cobb saw he couldn't make it and easily beat Walters' throw to third, only to find that Veach was there also.

Walter completely lost his head, and dashing to third he tagged both runners, putting Veach out. Then he saw Burns wildly footing it for second, and, forgetting the plate was unoccupied, whipped the ball to second to get Burns. That was Cobb's cue. Like a flash he was up and off. He was within ten feet of the plate before Walters knew what was going on, and scored with no trouble.

Sam Crawford, the Detroit veteran, did not make the last trip east. Hugh Jennings has decided to keep him out of the game for all time, reserving him for only pinch hitting duty.

Connie Mack recently declared that Cruse and Hornsby of the Cardinals are the finest looking young players

in baseball. He predicted that Hornsby by eventually would attain the same degree of excellence voted Jack Barry.

Dave Robertson is back as a regular in the Giant outfield, in spite of the good start made by Joe Wilhoit, who was sent in to fill Robertson's place.

Chuck Wortman of the Cubs seems doomed for the minors, or else mere utility infielder duty for the Cubs. His fielding, of the flashiest sensational sort, may hold him in the majors, but his hitting is too woefully weak to be considered. Pete Kilduff, recently obtained from the Giants, is a far better hitter and excellent fielder and a fast baserunner.

F. A. EPLING TAKES LONG TRIP THROUGH 25 STATES

F. A. Epling, secretary-treasurer of the Grande Ronde Meat Market, returned yesterday from a month's trip through eastern and southern states. During the trip Mr. Epling traveled through twenty-five states stopping off here and there along the way to see the country.

The crops throughout the middle-west, Mr. Epling says, are excellent except in western Kansas where they are turning the cattle into the fields because of burned condition of the grain.

In the southern states the people claim that they have a third more of cotton, potatoes and corn in cultivation than they have had in previous years.

Mr. Epling found his home town Jenkins, Kentucky, a city of 12,000 instead of a village of a few scattered houses as it was when he left it seven years ago. The town is a mining town and 300 cars are loaded with coal daily.

The trip which required six days

going and eight days coming was made down through the Gulf states and back over the northern route.

They wouldn't run in the first place and in the second place when the rope hit their horns they laid down and refused to get up for the roper to flank them. Consequently the contest was called off and will not be attempted again.
