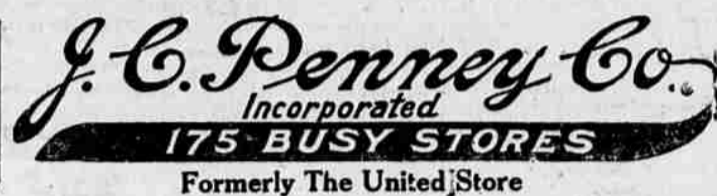

## PORTLAND MARKET REPORT

August 17, 1917  
The volume of business transacted in the Portland Union Stock Yards today is shown in the receipts of—

500 Cattle  
300 Hogs  
1100 Sheep

The market was steady in the cattle pens and strong and active in the hog and sheep department.

Cattle  
There were no change in prices paid for cattle in the various classes throughout the day from those quoted previously. All tail ends and feeder stuff selected from shipments through the week were cleared out of the Yards today at current prices.

Hogs  
The hog market is still pointing actively upward, although no change in quotations were obtainable during the market hours of the day in fat hog and packer departments. Pigs and feeders took an active part in the market this morning, stepping ahead about 50 cents; the resulting quotation is \$15.50 to 16.

Sheep  
A strong sheep market has been developed throughout the week and the accumulated strength resulted today in a change of quotations as follows:

Western Lambs ..... \$12.00 to \$12.75  
Valley Lambs ..... \$11.50 to \$12.00  
Yearlings ..... \$9.50 to \$10.25  
Wethers ..... \$9.25 to \$10.00  
Ewes ..... \$8.00 to \$8.50

Trading in the sheep houses seems to have been stimulated recently and the volume is increasing at a fair rate.

Gee—it is awfully warm here. The uniform is white pants and undershirts without sleeves so naturally I'm a little sunburned. I sure will have lots to tell you when I get back. Don't know where we are going when we leave here, but will write to you next chance I get. Am feeling fine. Who ever thought I would go through the Panama? You can tell everyone I'm no torry that I joined the navy because I sure am seeing a little of the country. Haven't read a paper for nearly two weeks so don't know how the war is going on. Don't know when we will get mail, some say not until we get up around New York. Will close, Mother dear, with love to all, Joe.

the county council to co-operate with and to co-ordinate the activities of all societies in the county so that duplication of effort will be avoided. Auxiliaries to the county council will be formed in each community and the work spread throughout the county. The members last night realized that they were tackling a big job, but it is desired to complete the organization at once so that when the state and nation call there will be an effective organization which will be able to undertake to do whatever is required to do.

The fuel supply problem was discussed and Mr. Dunham Wright said that it was the duty of the people in the cities to lay in their supply of wood immediately and not to use coal or oil which were needed by the na-

tion. He said that there was plenty of wood in the mountains and that there was no necessity for people to go cold in winter if they would only take pains to lay in their supply before the roads became bad in the winter.

The chairman was authorized to appoint the necessary sub-committees and the meeting adjourned to meet again at the call of the chair.
