**Schooner May Go To Europe**  
Aberdeen, Wash., Aug. 24.—(United Press)—The big motor schooner Grays Harbor—the largest ship of her class built on the coast—may go to Europe after taking a cargo of lumber to South American ports, shipping men said here today.

The Grays Harbor is owned by Gaston Williams & Wilmore, of Wilmington, Del. She measures 290 feet over all, with a 48-foot beam and 26-foot depth of hold. She will carry 2,000,000 feet of lumber.

The crew on the Grays Harbor will live almost as comfortably as the captain. The vessel was built to meet the standards of the seamen's act and has separate sleeping quarters for the crew, electric lights, shower baths and a mess room in the fore-castle. The entire ship is electrically lighted, a new feature for sailing vessels.

The boat will leave soon for South America with a load of lumber. At Chile she will probably take a cargo of nitrates for New York.

**RACE MEET AT ENTERPRISE WAS HUGE SUCCESS**

**FARNHAM, HOLLISTER AND WILLIAMS ARE CONQUERORS, RECORD CROWD IN ATTENDANCE**

The Northwest Grand Prix riders and drivers and Motor enthusiasts and management of the Enterprise race meet are home after holding one of the most successful meets ever held on a half mile track in the northwest. Riders and drivers together gave one of the most grueling contests and exhibitions of speed, stamina and endurance ever demonstrated in this section of the country. The race meet was sensational thruout and lap after lap as the "speed demons" cannoned their way past the grand stand the immense audience was continuously brought to their feet for it was an afternoon of daring, thrilling, daredevil riding and driving put on by master riders who drove in true championship form.

At promptly two fifteen the management gave a short introduction and explanation of the program and introduced Dustin Farnham the Northwestern grand Prix champion who would make an attempt at establishing a track record on the one-half mile oval, on the fastest machine on the Pacific Coast. Just as the band struck up "The Tune," Dustin mounted his infallible "Big Valve Indian" and after circling the track once was off with the speed of the wind in his track setting time of 34 sec. flat. Hollister was then sent off on his "Harley" for the track record and after circling the track once was off on his mile minute pace. The appearance of these two drivers and their results on the track started the crowd on their high pitch of excitement from which they never recovered till the concluding event on the program was announced.

5—Ten mile race free for all. Dustin Farnham, Indian, time 13:45 2-5; Hollister, Harley, 2nd.

6—Trial for track record with the autos. Hollister, Mitchell, time 40 1-2; Farham, Vellie Special, 43; Red Williams, Maxwell, 43 1-2; Haney Chevrolet, 45; Steele, Interstate, 45 4-5.

7—Three miles for cars. Williams, Maxwell, 1st, time 5 min. 2 sec; Hollister, Mitchell, 2nd; Farnham, Vellie, 3rd.

8—Australian Pursuit race ten miles. Won by Red Williams "Maxwell." Entries, Farnham, Vellie; Haney, Chevrolet; Hollister, Mitchell; Williams, Maxwell.

9—Five mile race free for all. Hollister, Mitchell, 1st, time 7:37; Williams, Maxwell.
