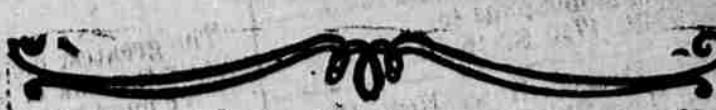

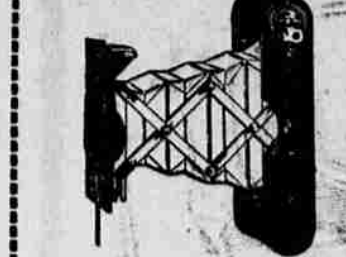
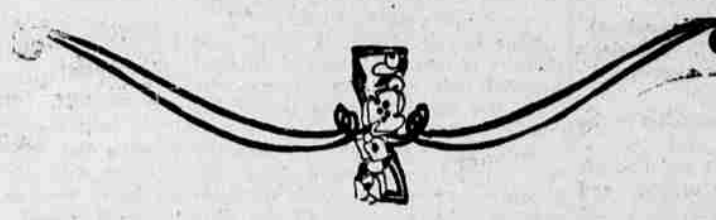

On Visit—Glady Thornton of Palouse, Wash., went to Enterprise this morning for an extended visit with friends.

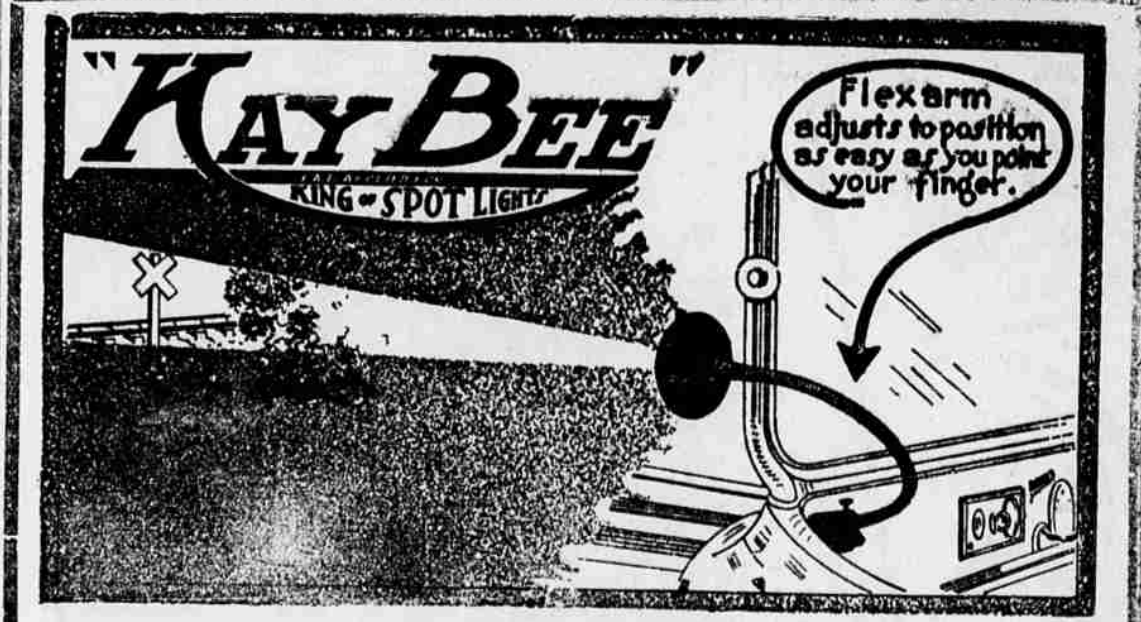
