Visiting Relatives—Mrs. August Moser and children arrived here Tuesday evening for a few week's visit with relatives. Mr. Moser expects to

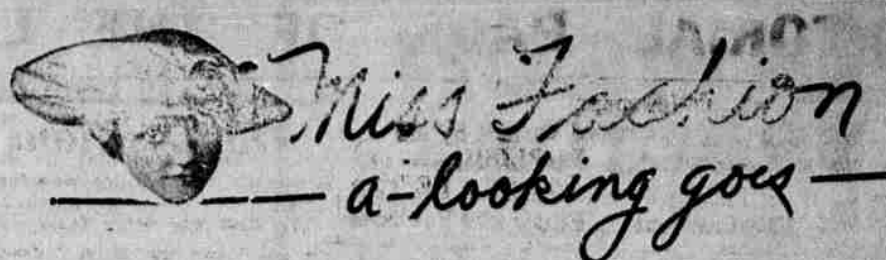
