MC GRAW HANDICAPPED BY LACK OF CATCHERS

New York, Sept. 1.—When John McGraw does what it is expected he will do in leading his team into the 1917 world's series, he will be carrying the most delicate set of catchers along that the game has sheltered for many a day. Lew McCarty is expected to be there with his broken leg, and George Gibson's brittle thumbs will be in action.

The season, for McGraw, has been a succession of trouble with catchers. First, McCarty tried to tear out a base with his leg and suffered a broken one. Then Gibson got his hand in the way of a foul tip and his thumb was broken. At various times Bill Rariden has been running around with half a hand or so split by foul tips.

Just as McGraw sold Ernie Krueger, a promising young receiver, a blow fell on his catching staff and he was compelled to buy young Snyder from Brooklyn. He tried to wheedle Robinson into letting him have Krueger back, but the attempt was fruitless.

John McGraw will take his fling at a world's championship this year with just three pitchers of any noted effectiveness, and they all are left-handed. Schupp, Benton and Sallee will have to carry the burden, with the bulk of pronunciation falling on the Schupp.

Little can be expected of Perritt, Tesreau or Anderson in a struggle with one of the powerful American clubs, and it is regarded as doubtful in some quarters if Sallee will be of more than passing interest to a club like the White Sox or Red Sox.

It is now being pointed out that McGraw's left handers have been able to win only because McGraw's hitters have been able to maul the daylights out of opposing pitchers and score an abundance of runs. Whether they will be able to supply those leads when they face the superb hurling that exists in the American league is furnishing the subject for a lot of arguments.

WHO WILL BENNY LEONARD FIGHT NEXT

New York, Sept. 1.—Regardless of the loud outcries from Joe Welling, Frankie Calahan, Willie Jackson and other lightweights, it now is almost certain that Benny Leonard's next bout of any importance will be with Johnny Dundee or Charlie White as an opponent.

Out west they're yelling for a chance to see Leonard and White, the two great knock-'em-dead artists, get together and try each other's resistance.

In the east they can't see any one but Dundee, since it is an accepted fact that the Johnston-Gibson feud will keep Welling from getting a chance soon.

White has had more chances at the lightweight championship than any man in the ring. He is the only man who ever induced Freddie Welsh to risk his title in a twenty-round bout. He had several cracks at Welsh in shorter bouts and he also took on Willie Ritchie when that youth held the championship. He never has come more than just close to getting the title.

White admits he hasn't a chance to outpoint the clever Leonard, but he believes implicitly in his ability to slip over the deadly left hook and flog Leonard. He discounts Leonard's ability to hit him with that equally deadly right hand.

Nate Lewis, manager of White, has figured it out that Leonard will be so busy keeping his chin protected from the left hand hooks he won't have a chance to use the heavy right.

Lewis is clever in this statement. He has long recognized the fact that everyone fears White's left hook and pays little or no attention to his right hand. As a matter of fact White is nearly if not quite, as heavy a puncher with a right cross as he is with a left hook. Any boxer who goes after White with the intention of disregarding the right hand is likely to wake up about an hour after White puts the right over.

Leonard has been unselfish in his fighting since he won the championship. He has met every man so far that the public demanded. In meeting Kilbane it was generally conceded he was going against his toughest opponent. His easy victory over the featherweight champion took speculation back to the lightweight class. It is extremely probable that Leonard's next start will be announced very soon, with either Dundee or White as his opponent.
