Letters From The Front

(Letter from Roy B. Currey, of the La Grande Hospital Unit, to his father, Fred B. Currey.)

Clackamas, Ore., Aug. 30, 1917.

Dear Papa:—Well it looks like we would leave here as per schedule—8 a. m. Saturday, and leave Portland at 10 a. m. We will probably be through La Grande on No. 18, or on No. 18's time. We will leave here with two tourists, 1 cook car, and probably two baggage cars. Possibly only one baggage car. If we have too much stuff we may make a special train, but that is hardly likely. The orders do not say anything about a special so I expect that 18 will be the train. We are routed through Omaha, Chicago, Buffalo and New York.

We will be inspected by Col. Newell tomorrow at 8:00. The rest of the day will be devoted to packing up and loading the cars.

We got another shot of anti-typhoid hop today and consequently are a little bit under the weather. Some of the vaccinations are pretty sore and we feel pretty rocky but no one is real sick. We ought to be about over the vaccination now. Mine took all right but my arm is not swelled.

How are the fires in that country? There must be some big fire near here as the smoke makes the sun red, and the other day you could smell it.

I got the towels and candy Carol sent today. I am pretty well fixed for towels now. The candy is swell and hits the spot. Ralph Russell got a box of fruit today so we ate pretty well.

We have been given a new designation now. We are known as Field Hospital No. 3 117th Sanitary Train, 42 Division. This means that we will get the auto truck equipment, etc., no mules to monkey with.

I understand that they are figuring on giving us some stuff to eat. If you can, and it is not too late, get us some fruit. I don't mean for you to buy said fruit, but apply the fund toward that end. However anything will be agreeable and acceptable.
