WILLIAMS' DEFEAT TOOK LITTLE FROM HIS RECORD

New York, Sept. 6—The fact that R. Norris Williams, II., long recognized as the personification of tennis excellence in the United States, lost to Nathaniel W. Nilesin, the semi-final round of the national patriotic singles

at Forest Hills this year, means little to the tennis ability of the former champion.

Every person who sat in the West Side Club's stands that rainy day and watched Williams flounder through his match with Niles in the mud realized that Niles was defeating a Williams who didn't even look like the Williams of Wimbledon and Newport. Williams' arms were white and his face didn't wear the tan that formerly denoted the active outdoor life of the famous Philadelphian. Williams was seriously wrapped up in his business of becoming an officer in the United States

Artillery. He had won a lieutenantcy. Until that was over tennis had no place in his thoughts. He entered the patriotic singles only because he felt he could help along the cause of the United States National Lawn Tennis Association by his appearance. His playing all through the tournament was ragged.

He nearly met defeat when he faced Leonard Beekman and Harold Thorckmorton. His placements were not placements when compared with the former deadly accuracy with which he planted returns in the very corners of the courts. In his match with Niles he lost a surprising number of points shot into the nets, something that the old Williams rarely was guilty of.

Williams' lack of form takes nothing from the brilliant performance of the Longwood veteran, for Niles played a game in winning that would have pressed Williams at any stage of his career. His plan was to return every shot he could reach, caring little whether it came within reach of Williams. He depended upon Williams to return the ball into the net or smash it out of the court, and Williams, because of his lack of practice, usually accommodated him. Williams stands to lose all his form during his stay with the Army, but that's a small matter with him. He is playing war just as hard as he ever played tennis.
