WAR MAKES WOOL GROWING BIG OPPORTUNITY AGAIN FOR AMERICA

Great Lakes Wool Convention in Chicago Sept. 11 and 12 Will Point Way for Uncle Sam's Main Chance in Present Imperative Need for Means to Clothe Soldiers and Civilians.

Chicago (Special) — Not since the "Shepherds watched their flocks by night" has the world faced such a shortage of wool as now. The markets of Christendom have been swept clean of every shred and fibre that was to be bought, and the question of clothing for the nations, and their armies is a question that must have an answer during the Great Lakes Wool Convention in Chicago, Sept. 11-12, to which the shepherds of the great western "wool states" have been invited.

The convention will be held in the Assembly Hall at the Union Stock Yards. The Stock Yards Inn will be the official headquarters, with loop headquarters at Hotel Sherman. In the culture of wool there awaits for the nation which shall take up this line of industry, the historic opportunity of riches, a bulletin issued by the National Sheep & Wool Bureau says. Today the world knows the use and value of wool for clothing, for the weaving of rugs and carpets, and for the various uses which this wonderful fibre alone will serve. But when the Duke of Burgundy instituted the Order of the Golden Fleece to encourage the woolen industry in England, the use of wool was restricted to comparatively few

garments; weaving was in its infancy. Flemish weavers were the more skillful, and to offset English efforts the Hansatic League was formed to prevent English wool from being sold on the continent.

But England's cheap labor and abundant water power, enabled her to compete successfully with Flemish artizans to teach her own weavers their arts. The woolen trade became the glory of England, and brought her untold wealth.

In the resuscitation of the wool industry today in the United States, a speakers at the Chicago Convention will explain, American sheep raisers have an opportunity to reap a rich harvest. The days of cheap wool are forever past, so far as this generation is concerned. In the opinion of agricultural experts, who declare that the climate of the Great Lake States, as well as the Western "sheep states" is as favorable to the development of this industry as that of England. With the production of wool reduced to a minimum abroad, Russia alone maintains her flocks, while South America and Australia are already taxed to their utmost to provide for their own consumption and the necessities of the warring nations, military and civilian.
