The City of La Grande has no powers or rights not conferred by its legal voters, and none exist for the measure referred to. Baker county possesses more wealth than either the City of La Grande or Union county. It is her bounden duty to provide the necessary assistance by way of charity or relief to her citizens embracing the town of Sumpter. If La Grande possessed a Charity Fund it has ample opportunity to administer the same for the benefit of indigents within our midst. The taxpayer of this municipal corporation is penalized to the full extent to provide municipal funds
