

PRESERVE

Canning Peaches and Apricots

According to Recipe of

Ida Cogswell Bailey Allen, Editor "Housewives' Forum." "Pictorial Review," furnished by National Commercial Gas Association.

Select ripe, but not over-ripe fruit, plunge it into boiling water for two minutes and then into cold water. Remove the skins and pits. To save jars the fruit should be sliced. Pack at once into clean jars. Pour over boiling syrup made by boiling together two and one-half cupsful of sugar and three quarts of water for 10 minutes. Next, adjust the rubbers which should be new, and of rubber—not a substitute—place the covers on the jars and adjust, but do not fasten the clamps. If screw-top jars are used, partly screw on the cover; place a wash boiler over the burners of the gas or electric stove, put the rack in the bottom and set in the jars. Cover the tops with warm water, fully an inch. If not quite covered loss of liquid is liable to result; however, the contents will not spoil. If the covers are adjusted too loosely there is also liable to be loss of liquid. Note carefully when the water begins to boil hard, or to "jump," then if gas is being used for fuel, reduce the flame, or if electricity, turn the switches to medium, but keep boiling rapidly for 16 minutes. Remove from the water and adjust the tops at once. Do not take off covers under any circumstances.

The space inside contains no germs, there can be no spoilage. Invert the jars on a cloth and let stand several hours to test. If there is any leakage, remove the caps and rubbers and reboil for 10 minutes. If convenient, wrap each jar in paper to prevent bleaching and store in a dark, dry place.

U. S. Naval Training Station,
San Francisco, Cal.
Aug. 30, 1917.

Dear Mother and Folks:
Your loving letter received last Saturday and it certainly did seem like a long time since I had heard from home. I suppose the old town is quiet

since the boys have left. I was reading the write up on their departure and it must have been a sad sight no doubt, but their departure must have been quite a contrast to ours. Hardly anyone knew we had gone until about a week after we had left, and only a few of the fellows saw us off. I like the Navy all right but I can't help wishing a little that I had waited and gone with the bunch. One hates to be parted from them sure, after having gone to school and chummed with them for four years, and as far as France is concerned I think we will all see sooner or later if the war lasts.
