opens Saturday Sept. 15.

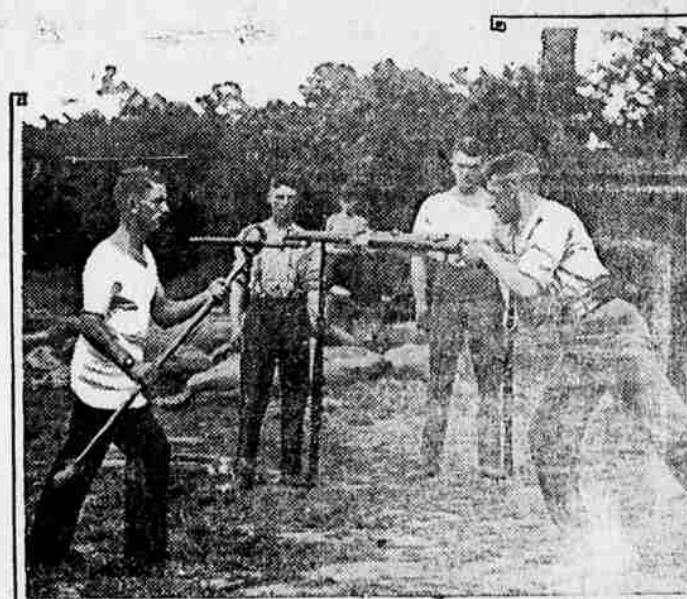
Enjoyable Outing—Mrs. M. A. Har-

The picture shows Great Britain's novel method of compelling
accuracy in bayonet fighting. A rope ring, six inches in diameter, held
on a pole by the second man is the target. Note the bayonet fixed to the
rifle against the right shoulder, putting the entire weight of the rifle
behind the lunge. If the recruit fails to put his bayonet through the
man holding the stick brings the lower end around and strikes the
