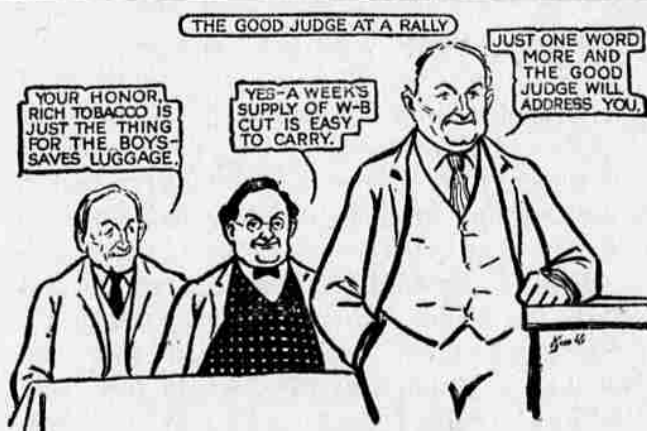

Recipe No. 2 - Canned Tomato Pulp

According to recipe of

IDA COGSWELL BAILEY ALLEN, EDITOR "HOUSEWIVES FORUM," "PICTORIAL REVIEW," FURNISHED BY NATIONAL COMMERCIAL GAS ASSOCIATION.

IT IS AN ECONOMY OF JARS TO CAN THE PULP ONLY, OF TOMATOES; THIS MAY BE USED IN THE MAKING OF SOUPS AND SAUCES. PLUNGE THE TOMATOES INTO BOILING WATER FOR TWO MINUTES, THEN INTO COLD WATER. CUT THEM UP AND BOIL FOR 30 MINUTES. RUB THE PULP THROUGH A SEIVE, ADD A TEASPOONFUL OF SALT TO EACH QUART, SET OVER THE GAS OR ELECTRIC BURNER AND BOIL TILL THICK, REDUCING THE HEAT AS NECESSARY. POUR INTO CLEAN GLASS JARS, ADJUST THE RUBBERS, WHICH SHOULD BE NEW, AND OF RUBBER—NOT A SUBSTITUTE—FILL WHAT SPACE IS LEFT IN THE JARS WITH WARM WATER, PLACE THE COVERS ON THE JARS AND ADJUST, BUT DO NOT FASTEN THE CLAMPS. IF SCREW TOP JARS ARE USED, PARTLY SCREW ON THE COVERS; PLACE A WASH BOILER OVER THE BURNERS, PUT THE RACK IN THE BOTTOM AND SET IN THE JARS. COVER THE TOPS WITH WARM WATER, FULLY AN INCH. IF NOT QUITE COVERED LOSS OF LIQUID IS LIABLE TO RESULT; HOWEVER, THE CONTENTS WILL NOT SPOIL. IF THE COVERS ARE ADJUSTED TOO LOOSELY THERE IS ALSO LIABLE TO BE LOSS OF LIQUID. NOTE CAREFULLY WHEN THE WATER BEGINS TO BOIL HARD, OR TO "JUMP," THEN REDUCE THE HEAT BUT KEEP BOILING RAPIDLY FOR 20 MINUTES FROM THE MOMENT THE WATER BEGINS TO BOIL. IF A PRESSURE COOKER IS USED, STERILIZE FOR 15 MINUTES. REMOVE FROM THE WATER AND ADJUST THE TOPS AT ONCE. DO NOT TAKE THE COVERS OFF UNDER ANY CIRCUMSTANCES.

THE SPACE INSIDE CONTAINS NO GERMS, THERE CAN BE NO SPOILAGE. INVERT THE JARS ON A CLOTH AND LET STAND SEVERAL HOURS TO TEST. IF THERE IS ANY LEAKAGE, REMOVE THE CAPS AND RUBBERS, PUT ON NEW RUBBERS AND REBOIL FOR 10 MINUTES. IF CONVENIENT, WRAP EACH JAR IN PAPER TO PREVENT BLEACHING AND STORE IN A DARK, DRY PLACE.

IN USING THE PULP, DILUTE IT WITH TWO-THIRDS THE AMOUNT OF HOT WATER.
