Letters From The Front

The following letter has been received by Mrs. G. E. Towrey, from her brother Surber Klein, of the Hospital Unit:

Garden City, L. I., N. Y., 9-9-17. Dearest Sister and Mother:

Well, it is just 1:30 P. M. and Sunday. Kind of a lonesome day here. Lots of visitors here. New Jersey boys are right back of us and have lots of visitors for I can see them from here. I am lying on my bed writing on my blankets. Otto Pieper and Clair Shores and I all went to town last night (Hemstead) and walked around awhile and bought a lantern and came back home. The streets were just packed with soldiers. There are several towns the size of La Grande three or four miles apart, but Hemstead is as far as we are allowed to go without a pass. They have soldiers all around that they call "M. P.'s" (Military Police) and are stationed on street cars, etc., and in close by town. If you get on a street car they make you show your pass and if you haven't any they have the right to arrest you or bring you back. They say Hemstead was dead before the camp opened up and now every place in town is rushed to death.

Taxis are just thick hauling soldiers to and from town, 10c. They try to hold you up for everything here. Some of the boys are back from New York already and say they all got their fill of it pretty quick, so I think I am money ahead by staying home. I don't think anything is as cheap here as in the West.

It seems so funny to go in a grocery store and see counters full of beer, wine and all kinds of liquor. They all sell it.

Another Hospital Company, No. 2, came in from Nebraska yesterday, and one more to come, No. 4, from Colorado.

They have souvenirs of the Army here and want 10 prices for them. Everything is Jews.

I guess we will start to drill tomorrow or Tuesday. Probably Tuesday, for we get our shot in the arm Monday.

Some of the boys who were in New York found out for sure and Wall

Street is betting 4 to 1 that the Rainbow Division will never go to France. So I feel more at ease. You can tell LiDesco for I wrote to her this A. M. but none of the boys yet.

I think I will go to the picture show tonight and see Charlie Chaplin. Sunday seems kind of different here today. A fellow just came by our tent selling cigars and I got one. It seems so funny. In town cigars, etc., are 6 and 7 cents, and so on. We got a supply of pennies already. They hardly know what a gold piece is. I took some laundry down last night and can't get it until Friday so you can imagine how busy they are. The stores last night were just packed with soldiers and they even have traffic cops in a town that size. The eastern soldiers are not near as neat as the western and do not look near as good as the Third Oregon regiment at Clackamas.

Some of the boys went to Coney Island.

Well, I will close for today and write again tomorrow. Awful anxious to hear from you. Just opened the huckleberries today for Sunday dinner and they sure were fine.

The following letter has been received from Sidney Happersett, of the Hospital Corps:

Camp Mills, L. I., Sept. 9, '17. Dear Sir:—The Oregon Field Hospital Corps is now duly encamped on Long Island and we are now known as Field Hospital No. 3.

It is still hard to believe we are on the other side of the United States as things look about the same except they are much greener here than on the Pacific Coast, as they have had plenty of rain, in fact, they have had more than any of us care for already.

We got here Thursday morning and started to make camp. About that time it started to rain and only let up when we got the tents almost all up.

Last night they finished our cook house and about 2 o'clock this morning it started to rain and we had to move the stove and equipment that goes with a kitchen into the building in some rush as it sure can rain on this island.

The island is about 40 miles long and 15 miles wide and we must be somewhere near the center of it.

When the weather is good there is often three or more airplanes in the air at once. At first it was quite a novelty to watch them, but you soon get used to them and their hum.

The provisions of good things that the boys brought from home are beginning to run low, though there are still eats from home yet to be eaten.

All the fellows sure appreciated the boxes of eats that the people of La Grande and the other towns in Eastern Oregon gave them.

I wish the people who gave the boxes could have heard some of the descriptions that the boys gave men of other companies and people along the route. Some of them have tried to enlarge a little, but it couldn't be done, because there is almost no way of describing the number of chickens that were sacrificed for us and there seemed no limit to the cookies and cakes. We had to move the fruit into the vestibules of the cars before we could go to bed as the train was just about swamped with such a grand assortment of good things.

This camp is what they call an open camp and we are allowed to go outside at night, but we have to be in at 10 P. M. and are not allowed on street cars or trains going to New York City.

We are allowed a pass for 24 hours leave once a week on which we can go anywhere we want to within that time, just so long as we do not stay over our leave.

Most of the fellows are in New York City this afternoon. A few have to stay in camp to look after things and cook for those who show up to eat, though there were very few to dinner.

There is rather a good joke on Tom Murphy. He went over to the canteen and asked them to give him two four-bit pieces for a dollar, the fellow in charge said we haven't got any of them.
