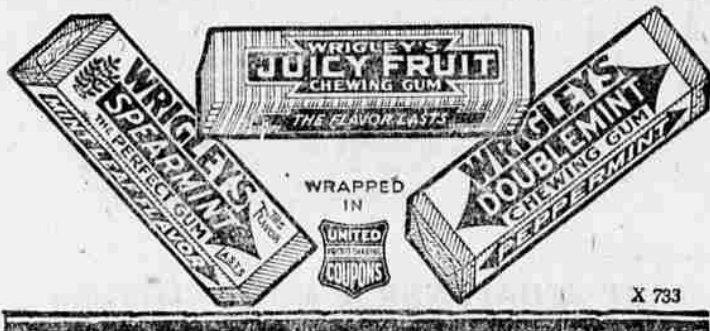

MAKE IT HOT FOR KAISER BY SAVING COAL.

(By United Press.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 13.—If you want to make things hot for Kaiser Bill, start right at home—in the basement furnace or the kitchen stove. A little scientific attention to your coal problem will generate enough heat to drive the flames of liberty over Germany. Phenomenal as it seems, your furnace can help finance the next liberty loan.

Here's how:

Stop wasting coal, and you can save enough to buy a liberty bond. Maybe two or three—if you save with a vengeance. The Government says, in short: "Coal is literally—and figuratively—the burning problem of the hour." President Wilson has just appointed a coal dictator, and the business world is thinking and talking about coal.

If you are using coal the way you have always used it, you are wasting from \$50 to \$100 a year. And coal—not to mention money—is too precious a jewel to be squandered these days. It is the bedrock sinew of war.

Comes now a mighty expert employed by Uncle Sam—Van H. Manning, director of the Bureau of Mines—to tell

you just how the next liberty loan can be floated in your furnace, so to speak, in the liquid fire of patriotism.

In the drab days of peace, you can light cigars with \$10 bills—and get away with it. But try it today, and you play into the hands of Prussia. The same with coal. In normal times you can toss coal into your furnace with little or no thought. But normal times are past. Director Manning believes that you can save from \$1 to \$2 a week by caring about coal. And he can prove it, too. Listen:

"In the search for the truth as to just what can be done by a household furnace in heating his 10-room house in New Haven, Conn., in the Winter of 1912-13, when coal was yet comparatively cheap. He kept that house at an average temperature of 69 degrees for 7 months and 10 days at a cost of \$40 for coal and \$8 for cord wood that was used in a grate, more for cheerfulness than anything else. He used 9 2-5 tons of coal at a cost of \$4.25 a ton.

"That man's cost of heating was from \$50 to \$100 less than what was expended by a large number of householders living in the same locality and having the same heating requirements.

The problem now is that if the Yale professor by a careful, intelligent firing of his furnace can save from \$50 to \$100 a year over his neighbors when the cost of coal was low, how much can he and other citizens who care to try

save with coal costing in many instances twice as much and more?

PRESERVE

Recipe No. Three

CHILE SAUCE

According to recipe of Ida Cogswell Bailey Allen, editor "Housewives" Forum of "Pictorial Review," furnished by the National Commercial Gas Association:

18 LARGE RIPE TOMATOES

4 SWEET PEPPERS CHOPPED

2 LARGE ONIONS, CHOPPED

1 1-2 TABLESPOONS SALT

6 TABLESPOONS BROWN SUGAR

1 1-2 TABLESPOONS WHOLE CLOVES

1 1-2 TABLESPOONS BROKEN STICK CINNAMON

1 1-2 CUPS VINEGAR

Dip the tomatoes into boiling water, then in cold and remove the skins and blossom ends. Chop fine, combine with other ingredients, the spice being tied in a bit of cloth, and bring to boiling point. Then cook slowly uncovered till thick, stirring occasionally. In the meantime, boil glass jars. Drain one at a time and fill to overflowing with boiling mixture. Adjust rubbers and caps, which also should be boiled, at once. If desired, the jars may be boiled as described in previous advertisement for canned peaches, for 10 minutes to obviate possible spoilage.
