Letters From The Front

The following letter has been received by Mrs. T. E. Person from her son, who is in the Army.

An English Port, Aug. 24, 1917

Dear Mother: After 14 days at sea we are safe in England. But we do not know just where we are going from here. The trip over was uneventful as we never so much as saw a sub. There were six ships in the fleet, and we were all together from Halifax. One ship had a Canadian regiment aboard. The rest were U. S. troops. We will land in the morning and then we expect to go somewhere in England for a few days and then go to France. We did not get to go ashore in Halifax, as we were only there about two hours. From where we are we can see the cliffs of England and above them the hill sides are all covered with wheat fields, most of them ready for the harvest. Well, as we are about to go into port, and the mail is to be taken up, I will have to close. With love to all, your son, IRWIN.
