North Powder, Sept. 20.—(Special.)—The town of North Powder was saddened Sunday last on learning of the death of Albert McHarry, at the hospital in Baker. The parents of this young man are pioneers in this section having come to this section several years ago. The young man had been sick only a short time and his death was a surprise to most of his friends and acquaintances. There seems to be some misunderstanding as to the disease that caused his death. It has been reported as pneumonia and ty-

phoid. It is said that the breaking of an abscess in his throat hastened the end. The remains were tenderly laid to rest in the North Powder cemetery on Monday. Rev. Edwards delivered the funeral address. The business houses were closed during the services and a large number of friends and relatives were present to pay their respects to a fine young man cut off in the bloom of youth. The parents and family have the sympathy of everyone in their sad and sudden bereavement.

The remains of Miss Matilda Neil were interred in the North Powder cemetery on September 4. She died at the home of a sister in Prosser, Wash., on August 31. She had been an invalid for years. She was born in this vicinity and a mother, brother and sister rested in this cemetery, so she was laid to rest by them. The Odd Fellows conducted the services. Rev. Pratt delivered the funeral sermon. Several relatives were in attendance at the funeral.

The rain was followed by a killing frost on the night of the 13th. However, the frost did not damage in this vicinity.

The North Powder school reopened last Monday with a good attendance. With the new equipment, new school house and a good corps of teachers and fine healthy boys and girls, North Powder will have a successful school year.

The recent rain put out the forest fires, much to the relief of the fighters and all other people in this section. Evans & Yorke have leased the warehouse at Telocaset and will buy grain at that point. L. B. Hyatt will handle the business for them.

It is reported that J. E. Lenheart had an operation performed on his eyes at Pasadena, Cal. His eyes are now bandaged and the result of the operation will not be known for some time until the bandages are taken off. Mr. Lenheart's friends hope that he will fully recover his sight.
