LONDON, Aug. 28.—(By Mail.)—How a British officer feels just before going into action is tragically described in the following letter to his parents:

"My Darling Mater and Dad:
"Tomorrow at dawn there's a hell of a show coming off and this will only reach you if I get knocked out. Mater, be brave—for God's sake be as brave as I know you can be—for it's hell to bear.
"Anyhow, you'll be proud, too, won't you? 'Cos it's the best death a chap can have.
"Do not think with pain of the things I loved; the favorite songs; the friends; the tennis; the picnics on the downs, but let their memory make you enjoy them the more!
"Nothing to say and this is a horrid letter to write. So good-bye, Mother and Dad—and—and—cheer up everyone!"
