They are hearing with their own ears the stories of Belgian women and French women. They listen with horror and an indignation that is holy arises. "We are anxious to get into the trenches," writes an American private home. "We have heard with our own ears the stories of three French women who were captured and kept prisoners in their dugout by the Boches." The atrocities in Belgium, the crimes against women and children will go down in history as the crimes that filled the American people and aroused their fighting spirit to a fever heat. We must know what we are fighting about. Some Americans may not care much about world democracy, but they surely will fight to preserve the honor of our women. Think what would have happened if the Germans had landed on our shores.

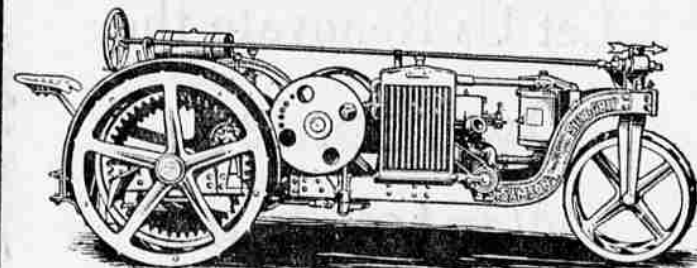
Mr. Man
