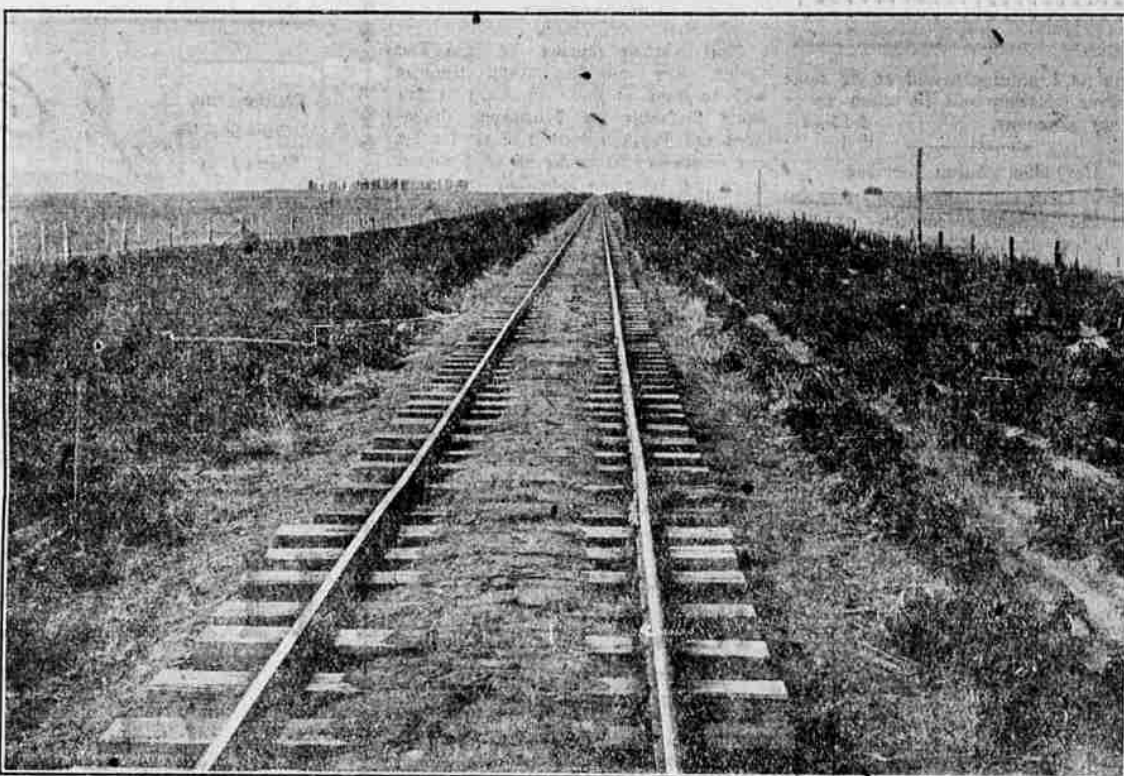

RAILROAD WAR GARDENS ARE SEEN ALONG THE O. W. R. & N. RIGHT OF WAY



LONGEST POTATO FIELD IN WORLD ON JOSEPH BRANCH, GRANDE RONDE VALLEY, EASTERN, OR.

Fifteen Miles of the right-of-way of the O.-W. R. R. & N. on both sides of track are planted to potatoes by the owners of the land adjoining and good crops are now being garnered.

Railroad war gardens are in evidence along the line of the O.-W. R. R. & N. Union County, Ore., has its share. The company tendered the use of its right-of-way and other lots and lands free of charge to employees, in order that they might aid in the food conservation campaign by adding to the quantity produced.

While considerable company land has been in use heretofore, the 1917 plantings exceed those of any former year. Some 1400 acres are being cultivated and harvested. The harvest season for vegetables began in July, has been continuous since then, and the products garnered will meet the needs of employees until another season.

The railroad folk are supplying the table with the vegetables grown on over 300 acres of gardens. This means more than 1000 gardens, for the tracts tilled in many instances are small.

Others than employees avail themselves of the privilege of farming the

right-of-way. Owners of land adjoining the railroad cultivate the railroad lands. One striking instance of this is a potato field on the Joseph branch in the Grande Ronde Valley. For 15 miles on either side of the track the land is planted to potatoes, and a good crop is assured. This is said to be the longest potato field in the world. Further along in the valley corn and oats are the crops, and the farmers add to their products in large measure by the use of the lands.

The section foremen, and there are more than 200 of them on the lines of the company in Oregon, Washington and Idaho, have not only gardens, but many of them have a cow or two, some pigs and a flock of chickens. They know of the high cost of living only from hearsay.

The response of the employees of the offer of the company was general. Those who planted gardens for the first time are enthusiastic over their products and announce their intention

of planting more ground another year. And hundreds of employees who are home owners are cultivating the ground they own, and purpose continuing to do so.

Since the announcement of the company in March of this year that company lands were available free of charge for gardening purposes, employees have asked for and are cultivating garden tracts embracing an area of over 85 miles. Prior to March, they were growing vegetables on 12 acres.
