## NEW PHONE SYSTEM WILL BE INSTALLED

Most Modern Equipment Ordered and Another Central Office Has Been Rented.

Enterprise, Sept. 24.—(Special).—A modern common battery telephone system equal to those of La Grande, Pendleton and Baker will be installed very soon in Enterprise, says the Record-Chief. The management of the Home Independent Telephone Company has placed an order with the Kellogg Switchboard & Supply Company, of Chicago, for more than \$6000 worth of new equipment. This will include an up-to-date common battery switchboard and 300 telephones. All are of the most improved pattern and the devices have several improvements over those installed a few years ago.

The total expenditure of the company, in order to make the change, will be close to \$10,000. Material and labor are considerably higher now than before the war.

The changes will be made in connection with the removal of the central office to Ben Weathers' building, now occupied by the postoffice which goes to the Burnhugh building as soon as new equipment can be provided for it. The Weathers' building will be thoroughly overhauled and an extension built on the rear, back to the alley. A 10-year lease has been taken on the building.

The commonbattery system means the doing away of the crank at each telephone. By lifting the receiver the signal is given to central. This calls for new telephones and also for switchboard and equipment to match. The new system will be the same as is used in most larger towns and cities.

The Enterprise exchange at present has about 400 patrons, of which 100 are rural subscribers. Officials of the company think this is hardly a large enough exchange to justify the outlay for a common battery system, but as the business is growing steadily, and present quarters are not adequate, a change had to be made, and it was decided to prepare for the future. A majority of the business customers expressed their willingness to pay the higher rate such a system would require, and their petition warranted the company in going ahead. At this time it cannot be said what the new rates will be but they probably will be similar to those in other Eastern Oregon cities such as Baker and La Grande, which have much the same service. Rates, in any event, will be under the control of the Oregon Public Service Commission.

On account of the delay of the factory in filling orders, it probably will be December before the new plant

will be ready for use. In the meantime the building and outside construction will be made ready.

S. D. Crowe, of the company, was in from La Grande last week making plans for the new work. He was accompanied by W. D. DeVarney, division commercial agent of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Company, with headquarters at Portland. The two went to the Innaha Saturday afternoon on a little outing before returning to La Grande.
