PLEADS NOT GUILTY IN MURDER CASE

(United Press.)
Concord, N. C., Sept. 25.—Gaston Means, alleged juggler of women's fortunes confessed recipient of German gold, pleaded not guilty of the charge of murdering his millionaire benefactress, Mrs. Maude King.
Means contends that Mrs. King, wearing high-heeled shoes, tripped and accidentally shot herself when falling.
The state scored the first strong point when the coroner and Physician Burbeister testified that Mrs. King's death wound was inflicted in the left side of her head, whereas the autopsy has proved that Mrs. King was right handed.
L. A. Weddington, undertaker, testified that Mrs. King had only hose on her feet when he received the body, not slippers as Means claimed.

PRESIDENT APPROVES OF STEEL MILL AGREEMENT.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 25.—President Wilson approved the agreement between the war industry board and steel men for the Government prices on steel and its products. Now Government prices are 50 to 75 per cent below market quotations.
