Letters From The Front

The following letter has been received by F. M. Martin, of Imbler, from Arthur Martin, who is a member of the La Grande Hospital Unit: Hemstead, Long Island, N. Y. Sept. 10, 1917.

Dear Home Folks:

Just received mother's letter also a letter from my Lostine friend, which is the first mail I have received here.

I am trying to write in the Y. M. C. A. that is one of them, there are three in this burg that I know of. The first one I went to was so full I could hardly get in let alone write—this one is almost as bad, but I did find a little table room.

It is quite cool here especially at night, otherwise it is a fine place.

I went to New York City Saturday and came back Sunday. I will tell you step by step about my trip but I can't go into detail much for it would take a week to write it and under a new regulation we are only allowed to be in town from 6:00 to 9:30. It is 7:30 now and I have to start to camp at 9:00 in order to make it for taps at 9:45. It is about two miles from here.

I left here at 12:30 on the electric train, Saturday and after changing cars at Jamaica I got to the Pennsylvania station at 1:30 (fare 65c) the same route we came in on but I wanted to go over it by day.

The Pennsylvania station is underground and we went up to the street level on a moving stair-way. I suppose you know what that is, it not, we just walked along with the crowd till the floor beneath us began to move it soon changed to stairs and when we got to the top changed back to a floor again and we walked out into the street. We then went down and took a brief look at Fifth Avenue and then on down to the waterfront where we ate lunch and my pard and I lost the two fellows who were with us. We saw them no more till we got back to camp the next day. We stayed in the waterfront district till about 5 p. m. observing the many nationalities of foreigners and their places of business. We then went up to Central Park (the largest park in the city) and looked it over hurriedly. One corner of it touched Broadway and up and down Broadway we rode on the street car looking at the skyscrapers, and other places of interest.

I sent you post card folder from New York City. Notice the Woolworth building, I saw it, it is the tallest inhabited building in the world fifty-six stories above ground and three below. The Flat Iron building is a very unique building being three cornered and of a color which shows up well both day and night. It is also quite tall.

Broadway or "The Great White Way" is the longest street of its kind in the world and the only street in New York which runs north and south. The rest run south-east by north-west and vice-versa. Broadway is fourteen and one half miles long and one half mile is built over water. It is strictly a street of amusements being composed of theatres, shows, movies, cafes, cabarets, news-stands, confectioneries, restaurants, hotels and similar places everything necessary for a good time. I dined on Broadway Saturday evening. I didn't go to any shows for I was too interested in seeing the outside of the "Great White Way." It is lighted in a grand manner and the color effects are something beyond comparison. About 1 o'clock my pard and I with twenty others went in a big sightseeing auto to see Chinatown and the Bowery. (The Bowery converges from the lower end of Broadway.) On our way the guide explained some places of interest—the Waldorf, Astoria and McAlpin hotels. He told us where President Wilson and W. J. Bryan stayed while in the city.

We went thru the Jewish district called (I think the Ghetto) and Chinatown were very odoriferous. In Chinatown we visited a Chinese mission. The main floor was similar to a church and in the basement we saw about twenty men supposed to be down and outers. They were sleeping on the cement floor with newspapers under them and no cover. We also visited the Chinese Joss house—house of worship and our guide explained the many statues, ornaments, and curios found there. We went thru what used to be a secret Chinese passageway between where and where I forgot. The streets in Chinatown are so narrow that we had to leave the car and walk thru. There is only five streets and they are not very long. There are 5000 Chinese there but they don't occupy much room. Our guide said that in the Ghetto on a hot night we would see people lying on roofs, sidewalks, fire escapes and anything else where they could get a breath of fresh air.

Saturday night was cool, at 1:30 when we were in Chinatown and the Ghetto you wouldn't have known it was night except for the dark. There was large crowds on the streets and all business houses were open.

I had my picture taken Saturday night and am sending two and will send more later.

I stayed at a seventh Avenue hotel Saturday night, (one block off upper Broadway) and took breakfast there Sunday morning.

We were supposed to be back at camp at noon Sunday so a little after ten we took a street car from Broadway to East 34th ferry and crossed over to Long Island City. The fellow with me was lost when we got on the ferry boat. I said, "well here we are on the boat" and he said, "where is the boat I don't see it." He thought we were still on the pier. The boat was crowded mostly with people getting out of town for Sunday. From Long Island we took the subway to Jamaica and the interurban to Hemstead and so to camp.

We were just in what is known as "Greater New York" that part located on Manhattan Island.

We saw a fine large Y. M. C. A. there. People there were very sociable and treated us quite nice due to the uniforms, I guess. In the Chinatown crowd there was, I think five khaki boys and 10 sailors (of the navy.)

We got our third and last shot in the arm today. Dr. Moore and Frost one of our lieutenants did the shooting. It happened that Moore did mine. They were not so rough as the fellows at Clackamas.

I talked to some fellows here from Chinook Kansas. There is a crowd of Oklahoma boys here but I haven't got acquainted with them yet.

The city is just like the stories say only it is much more realistic to see it than read about it.

Wall Street is betting 4 to 1 that we never go to France and there was a German peace proposal mentioned in today's paper. So it looks as if we are not sure of going to France after all. I haven't been to Coney Island yet but am going there Saturday, I think.

Between here and New York the towns run together till it is almost the same as one town.
