CENSOR OBJECTS TO TOMMY'S REFERENCE IN LETTER HOME

London, Sept. 11.—(By Mail).—In a letter home a Tommy gracefully mentioned that he had sent "a dozen Germans to Hell." The censor scored out the Satanic reference and wrote above it "it is not permissible to refer to the German headquarters."

IRIGOYEN SAYS ARGENTINE IS TO BE NEUTRAL

CONSIDERS GERMAN EXPLANATION OF LUXBURG INCIDENT SATISFACTORY.

(United Press.)
Buenos Aires, Oct. 1.—President Irigoyen considers Germany's explanation of the Luxburg incident satisfactory and will firmly adhere to a course of neutrality, according to a detailed outline of his position the national judicial committee announced today. Irigoyen insists that the United States cannot drag Argentina into the war. He announced that he would soon call a congress of American neutrals to decide on a united war stand.

PROHIBITION EFFECTIVE IN BRITISH COLUMBIA TODAY

Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 1.—Prohibition in a modified form went into effect in British Columbia today.

The importation of liquor for private use is permitted under the act. "Nothing in this act shall be construed to interfere with the right of any person to import from without the province liquor for bona fide use in his private dwelling house," the statute reads.

The act empowers the lieutenant governor to appoint vendors who are permitted to keep in stock and to sell liquors "for medical, mechanical, scientific and sacramental purposes only." The use of liquor in hospitals is restricted and the amount which can be held in a hospital, doctor's office or drugstore is limited.

The measure provides severe penalties and includes a right of search clause. For weeks the province has been preparing for prohibition. Stocks of liquor have been laid away in many homes and several cargoes of liquor shipped from Victoria and Vancouver to San Francisco.
