BLUESTONE OR FORMALIN WILL PREVENT SMUT

Treatment of seed wheat with either bluestone or formalin before planting should be practiced by every farmer in the county as a preventative against loss from smut. As a result of several year's investigation of smut control in grain by various experiment stations they have found that the use of bluestone or formalin are the only practical remedies to date for ordinary smut. They recommend the use of,

Copper sulphate (bluestone) one pound, water five gallons, or Formalin (a 40 per cent solution of formaldehyde) one pint to 40 gallons of water.

In using either one of these formulas be very accurate by weight and measure. Do not merely make a guess at it. When treating allow the grain to remain in the solution for ten minutes when using bluestone, 30 minutes when using formaldehyde. Remove the sack and drain, allowing the excess to run back in the barrel or tank and replenish as often as necessary from a stock solution so as to always have the sack completely immersed.

The results of the work in Eastern Washington seem to indicate that wheat, seeded in the summer before the first fall rains on summerfallow containing enough moisture to germinate the seed, was free of smut than wheat seeded later in the season. While seeding of grain several weeks after the first fall rains were also free of smut than those that had been seeded directly after the first rains. While shallow seeding also seemed to produce wheat free of smut than deep seeding.

Another point in producing wheat free of smut is to use as clean seed as possible. In all cases where grain is smutted, if clean seed can be bought in its place it would be advisable to do so, otherwise remove smut balls with fanning mill. But no matter how free the seed is from smut, it should always be treated before planting. Seed wheat that has been treated with bluestone and then dipped into a solution of lime-water for five to ten minutes will ordinarily give a better stand than wheat that has not received this additional treatment. The lime-water is made by dissolving one pound of quicklime and then adding ten gallons of water. In the use of formalin a new solution should be prepared each day as it loses its strength very rapidly, and seed grain treated with this solution will give better germination if dipped in clean water from five to ten minutes after removing from the formalin solution.
