GENERAL MCCAIN TELLS HOW TO DISPLAY FLAG

Washington, Oct. 2. — Warning

against desecration of the American
flag by enemy aliens and an order
for their summary arrest and punish-
ment has been issued by Attorney
General Gregory and is in the hands
of U. S. Attorneys throughout the
country today.

"Any alien enemy tearing down,
mutilating, abusing or desecrating the

United States Flag in any way," says
the order, "will be regarded as a
danger to the public peace or safety
and will be subject to summary ar-
rest and punishment."

In this connection Adjutant General
McCain has issued a pamphlet devoted
to the traditions and uses of the Stars
and Stripes for the information of the
general public.

There is neither federal law nor
rule for the manner in which the
civil population displays, hangs or
salutes the Flag, General McCain
pointed out. Such rules as there are
apply only to the Army and Navy.

"The only national laws there are
governing the use of the Flag," said
he, "was those providing that no
trade mark can be registered using
the Flag, coat of arms of other in-
signia of the United States or any
simulation thereof" and providing
penalties for misuse of the emblem
"within the District of Columbia."

There are, however, state laws gov-
erning the use or abuse of the flag.
The Attorney General's order takes
its authority from section 12 of Pres-
ident Wilson's proclamation of April
6, 1917, concerning the activities and
government of enemy aliens.

"In the army," said General Mc-
Cain, "it is the practice, each day
regardless of weather, to hoist the
Flag briskly at sunrise and lower it
slowly and ceremoniously at sunset,
indicating commencement and ces-
sation of the activities of the day."

"It is displayed at half mast Mem-
orial Day, May 30, until noon, and
at full mast from noon until sunset.
This also is done on other days named
by army authorities from time to
time. The Flag is always hoisted to
full staff before being lowered to
half mast."

General McCain recommends that
the Flag should never be used except
on a flag pole. For purposes of de-
coration he recommends bunting, but
never the Flag.

"If you must use it for decorative
purposes other than on a pole," said
McCain, "it should always be hung
flat, with the union to the north or
east. However, it should not be dis-
played horizontally or laid flat."

"Under no circumstances should it
be hung where it will be contaminated,
or be draped over chairs or benches.
No object or emblem of any kind
should be placed above or upon it."

"There is no objection to flying the
flag at night on civilian property if
it is not done for advertising purposes.
"The Flag is generally displayed on
Lincoln's and Washington's birthday,
Mother's Day, Memorial Day, Flag
Day and Independence Day."

"Where several flags or emblems
are displayed, the American Flag
should be in the center at the top.
In any parade the Flag should have
the place of honor."

"The Flag should never be displayed
with the Union down except as a
signal of distress at sea."

"Old or worn flags should not be
used, ever. They should be burned,
privately, without irreverence or dis-
respect."

"These views are merely suggestive
and not authoritative."
