AMERICAN AIR-FIGHTERS ARE SPROUTING WINGS

American Field Headquarters, France, Sept. 6.—(By Mail.)—Tucked away in the obscurity of France where even the war news filters through several days late, Uncle Sam's fledgling airfighters are beginning to sprout their wings.

You will find them in two big French airdromes—men of the Army and Navy and Americans of the French Foreign Legion who have temporarily expatriated themselves to learn flying.

The early bird man catches his coffee and rolls at 4:30 a. m. and from that time on until 10 o'clock at night—in good weather—his hazardous day is crowded with work and lectures and study.

The daily schedule calls for three hours rest between noon and 3 o'clock. Sometimes a fellow gets a chance to sleep in this period but more often he spends it propped up in his cot studying the whys and wherefores of the spiral spin.

Uncle Sam's own aviation field isn't an aviation field at all just now. Engineers are working there putting barracks and hangers or building the necessary railroad spurs with the aid of a band of complaining German prisoners. Pretty soon now, if the officials and the people at home come through with the material, this field will become one of the greatest aviation bases in the world. But the flyers can't wait so they're learning with the French.

Take the Army and Navy men's school. These men were picked because of their unusual qualifications and sent over here to France to study flying with experienced French airfighters. Already one class of Navy men has graduated from the preliminary course of flying and passed on to the second course where they will learn to handle the big machines which drop bombs and the fleet little craft that do the fighting.

Mingling with the American soldier and sailors are other Americans in blue uniforms, the uniform of the Foreign Legion, who flocked over here confident of learning somehow, somewhere the flying game more quickly than they could at home. They will be ready with the rest, when the time comes to fly before the American trenches and stifle the enemy guns.

Rich man's heir and poor man's son and the college athletic hero of a season ago are mingled together, taking the same course, living under the same discipline.

"The new student goes up in a plane with a double set of control levers," said a young lieutenant, the son of a former Mayor of New York. "If the student makes a mistake, the French pilot sitting behind him, gives a hand signal for the student to let go of everything. Then the pilot works the plane with his own levers and if it isn't too late he can prevent accidents. The double control lever saves a lot of fellows from getting hurt."

But people will get hurt despite the control system. Students at this school can point out two spots on their flying field where two American naval flyers fell to their death while learning. And farther down the field, behind a big hanger there is a pile of three of four junked airplanes, broken in minor flying accidents.

French officers admire the American sense of discipline. Here is an instance that the whole camp will remember. The pilot instructed his student to steer a straight course no matter what lay ahead because a green pupil is liable to upset his machine by attempting to turn. Both occupants of the machine had slight injuries but the instructor was satisfied he had a man of nerve.

The commission is now expected to consider individually the proposed advances.

TWELFTH FEDERAL RESERVE BANK ISSUES BULLETIN

San Francisco, Oct. 3.—Crops of the twelfth federal reserve district show a material increase, according to the bulletin of the Twelfth Federal Reserve bank issued Tuesday.

Wheat and barley, two of the big crops of the northwest, show a decreased yield of 18 per cent; 64,796,000 bushels against 78,448,000 in 1916, being the figures for wheat alone given in the bulletin.

Pacific northwest lumber production shows a decided decrease under corresponding months a year ago. The decrease in the production of 147 northwest mills is 50 per cent, with shipments averaging 17 per cent above actual output, according to the report.

August bank clearings for the 20 principal cities of the district increased 38 per cent over the corresponding month a year ago. On the other hand, building permits declined in the same cities 22 per cent.

LONDON POOR ARE STARVING, LETTER SAYS

Tacoma, Wash., Oct. 3.—The poor in London are starving, according to an

apparently uncensored letter which J. G. Flannery has today from his son, Clifford Flannery, now in France with an American unit.

"Children of the working class are in rags," the letter declares. "I am glad I enlisted, as this war must end soon, but it cannot until the United States doubles the lines. So the quicker the men enlist the sooner the human race will quit suffering."

He advises his parents to be extremely saving.

disappointment to everyone as Thye's splendid exhibition and his gentlemanly conduct had won him a host of friends who gathered around and offered their sympathy and good wishes for a speedy recovery.

Mr. Noregaard felt very much depressed after the bout and demonstrated his kindly feeling towards Thye and appreciation of the unfortunate ending of the contest by splitting the purse and standing one half the expense of professional attendance in caring for his injury.
