

## JURY ACQUITS MAN WHO SHOT BOGUS COUNT!

London, Eng., Oct. 4.—This is the story of Britain's first "unwritten law" acquittal of a man who killed.

It is a drama of love and war and ferment of human passions.

It tells how two British juries decided Douglas Malcolm, lieutenant in the Royal Artillery returning from the front in France to shoot the war slacker who as a bogus count had stolen his wife's affections, was not

a murderer, and set him free.

Woman is Beauty.

In the coroner's court at Paddington a woman sat. At first sight London called her "the woman of the Rossetti neck," for her beauty was classical, like that of a famous painting.

"Mrs. Malcolm," said Coroner Byrne to "the woman with the Rossetti neck," "did your husband know the truth of your liaison with the bogus Count de Borch?"

"I told him," she replied with a faint smile, "to divorce me—that there had been intimate relations between us."

Love Letter Read.

Then the coroner read a letter from Lieutenant Malcolm to his wife as the officer left for the bogus count's room, where he shot him with his army automatic:

To My Own Very Darling Dorothy—Dear God! It is time! Everything points to it that this creature is the

most unspeakable blackguard ever born. I shudder to think that he should even dare to speak to you. I simply cannot stand it any longer. I am going to thrash him until he is unrecognizable. I may shoot him if I think he has a gun. I expect he is too much of a cur to stand a thrashing. If the inevitable has to happen of course I may get it first. You see, I am quite cool.

I swear to you that I love you more than a man ever has loved a woman before, and if there is anything wrong in me it is because I love you too much. You are a brave woman—a noble, honorable, upright one, with a beautiful soul. I believe in God. I said yesterday I didn't but I do, I do and I thank Him from the bottom of my heart that He sent me over from France in time to save you from this devil incarnate. Your honor is safe, thank God.

"Goodbye! I love you and shall go on loving you to eternity—forever. I know I shall meet you in the next world if the worst happens. When you come to me you will come with open arms and those beautiful eyes shining—and you will say to me, 'Duggie, I forgive you!' Forever, your loving husband.

Wife Unmoved.

When the coroner's jury began its deliberations Mrs. Malcolm walked unmoved from the court room, without a tear in her eyes or a tremble on her lips.

While the coroner was reading the verdict of "justifiable homicide in self defense," Lieutenant Malcolm was being arraigned in Marleybone police court.

He is tall, well built, about 34, and he swayed from side to side as he spoke:

"I see published a wicked and scurrilous report that my wife had intimate relations with this man. I swear it is false. You see, she is all alone and has no one to look after her. It is false—absolutely false. Do you hear me? It is absolutely false, I say!"

Tried for Murder.

The trial of Lieutenant Malcolm in Marleybone court was formal.

The jurors heard of Lieutenant Malcolm's service in the Royal Artillery on the French front. It heard of Mrs. Malcolm's meeting with the Pole Baumburg, a war service slacker, at a garden party. It received details of his career as a ladies' man in his pose as Count de Borch, and of his own admissions that he had no right to a title. His letters to other women, among them a German woman spy, were read.

Caught Them Together.

How he exercised a strange fascination over Mrs. Malcolm, how her husband burst into a friend's house to find the "count" and the woman with the Rossetti neck together in the count's bedroom, how Lieutenant Malcolm thrashed his wife's seducer and tried for months to force him into a duel in order to save his wife and spare her name from gossip—and how a pistol lay almost within the Pole's reach as he was found dead—details like these the witnesses' stories unfolded.

Wife Confesses.

And the jurors drew in their minds a picture of a tall, tanned artillery officer, placing not only his life but his home before his country as a war sacrifice, refusing to believe in his wife's dishonor, when she herself protested to him, proclaiming her virtue in one court while she was confessing her disgrace in another, loving her in the face of her protestations of love for her paramour and determined to save her when she was glad to be lost.

And they acquitted him.

## Uncle Sam And O.A.C. Help Eradicate Smut

Corvallis, Or., Oct. 4.—Five young men of O. A. C. have been appointed by the United States Office of Cereal Investigations to help Oregon farmers in the control of smut, the most wasteful enemy of wheat in Oregon. The United States Government is co-operating in this movement as part of its plan to increase wheat yield next year, and pays all the expenses of the assistant in the field.

While these young specialists are in the field they will conduct treating demonstrations, hold meetings at which they explain the treatment, and distribute the College directions among the grain growers. The men are now in the field working to reach as many localities as possible in time for the fall planting.

The work will be conducted in co-

operation with the county agricultural agents and county councils. Further work will be continued next spring.
