## SELF-GOVERNMENT IS IN SIGHT FOR INDIA

London, Sept. 10.—(By Mail).—William Jennings Bryan will be glad to learn that self-government appears to be in sight for India. All friends of democracy, of course, will be glad that Bryan particularly for he will not have forgotten the howl that arose when he told the English right here in London that self-government was due India as its right.

Announcement of the fact has been made in connection with the preparations for a visit to India by Edwin S. Montagu, New Secretary for India. This is the same Montagu, who before he became secretary denounced India's governmental system as "too wooden, too iron, too inelastic, too antediluvian," for modern needs. Explaining what it is hoped to accomplish the new secretary made it clear he was voicing a government program, not his own addition as a reformer.

This program, in his language, is to take "substantial steps towards increasing the association of the Indians in every branch of the administration, gradual development of self-governing institutions, progressive realization of responsible government in India, as an integral part of the British empire." Liberals in England regard the steps being taken as one of the greatest advances for democratic government the world has witnessed. India with its large population divided into castes, races and religions, must have some experience of self-government they say, before the entire machinery is turned over to them.

A plan originating in India is being considered and may be acted upon favorably. This provides that each province of India shall have its own legislative council and administrative organization, under a British governor independent of the Indian central government at first; gradually this central government would exercise the functions of a federal government.

**McADOO WILL SPEAK IN NORTHWEST NEXT WEEK**  
Butte, Mont., Oct. 5.—Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo will start his invasion of the Pacific northwest in the interests of the second Liberty loan the first of next week.  
He will speak here Sunday, leaving here that night. He will visit Spokane, Seattle, Tacoma and Portland, arriving at the latter city October 10.  
McAdoo was originally scheduled to speak here at 11 o'clock, but Butte ministers are endeavoring to have the hour changed. They protest that their churches will be empty if the hour of the McAdoo meeting is not changed.

**TACOMA NEEDS PROTECTION FROM DRAFTED SOLDIERS.**  
(United Press.)  
Tacoma, Wash., Oct. 5.—Tacoma needs protection from the men stationed at Camp Lewis, believes Chief of Police Smith.  
Smith said today he would ask for military protection, especially on Saturday night. He believes a provost guard should be thrown about the city every Saturday night.  
"With the diminutive police force we have in Tacoma, it is impossible to attend to all the other police duties and watch the soldiers," said Chief Smith. "As a rule men from the camp are orderly gentlemen, but once in awhile they get in possession of alcohol and create a disturbance."
