FILM PRESIDENT
PASSES THRU LA GRANDE

Hiram Abrams, president of the Paramount Pictures Corporation, passed through La Grande, Or., Wednesday, in the course of a countrywide trip he is making in the interests of Paramount and Artercraft pictures. It is Mr. Abrams' purpose to cover, during this trip, every town in America in order to obtain a more intimate knowledge of the conditions under which exhibitors show the productions of the Paramount and Artercraft companies, and to assist them in solving the local problems that confront them.

This is the first time in the history of the motion picture industry that a trip of such extent and purpose is being undertaken by a prominent film executive and it is significant of the advance in business methods which this great industry has made within the past few years.

Mr. Abrams stated to a representative of The Observer that he has found the business conditions of Paramount and Artercraft exhibitors to be very satisfactory all over the country, and that the tendency toward the better presentation of motion pictures is decidedly marked.

"Just as the producing end of the motion picture industry has advanced immeasurably within the last few years," he said, "so has the exhibiting end of the business improved. There is no longer one Strand or Rialto in America; there is a Strand or Rialto in every town in the country, where photoplays are presented with good and appropriate music, and amid surrounding compatible with the excellence of the better pictures.

"Good music is now the rule instead of the exception in motion picture theatres. In fact, I believe that the average understanding and appreciation of good music has been raised greatly through the medium of the motion picture theatre.

The Paramount and Artercraft Companies distribute the productions of the Famous Players-Lasky Corporation, starring Mary Pickford, Douglas Fairbanks, George M. Cohan, Elsie Ferguson, Geraldine Farrar, William S. Hart, Marguerite Clark, Pauline Frederick, Jack Pickford, Sessue Hayakawa, Vivian Martin, George Beban, Billie Burke, Ann Pennington, Wallace Reid, Julian Eltinge, Lina Cavalieri, "Fatty" Arbuckle, Charles Ray, Enid Bennett and Dorothy Dalton (the last two in pictures produced under the personal supervision of the Thomas H. Ince), and the pictures personally produced by D. W. Griffith, Cecil B. DeMille, Thomas H. Ince and J. Stuart Blackton. Paramount also distributes the inimitable comedies produced by Mack Sennett, the Klever Komedies starring Victor Moore, Black Diamond Comedies, the Paramount-Bray Photographs (the magazine-on-the-screen), and the Paramount-Burton Holmes Travel pictures.

"There may be some important additions to this list of stars in the near future," said Mr. Abrams in reply to a question, "but I cannot discuss this matter now."

Mr. Abrams is accompanied by B. P. Schulberg, general manager of the Paramount Pictures Corporation. Mr. Schulberg is compiling a detailed chart founded upon the impression and opinions revealed at their conferences with exhibitors, upon which will be based the constructive improvements in the systems of Paramount and Artercraft that will follow immediately upon the termination of the trip.

Mr. Abrams and Mr. Schulberg left New York Monday, September 17th. It is estimated that they will meet over 5000 exhibitors in the course of their travels and stop at over 800 towns and cities. The trip will take between four and six months to complete.

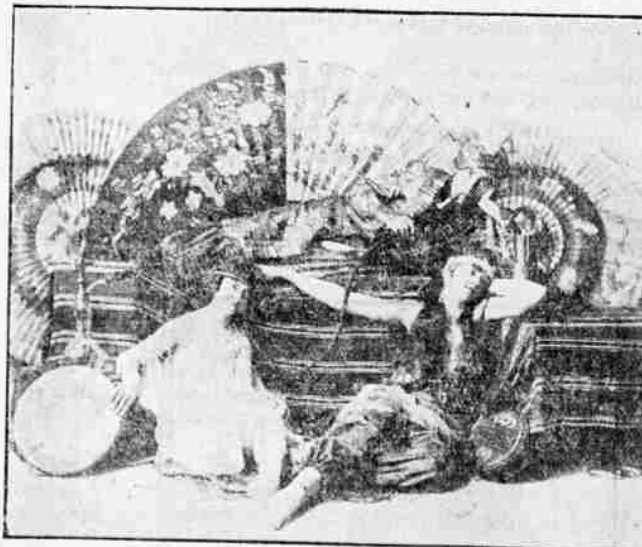
