"A Liberty Bond is a diploma in the school of thrift," declared S. W. Straus, president of the American Society of Thrift, in a letter to the editor of The Observer.

UNITED STATES BONDS.

The United States Government issues bonds in two forms: (1) Bearer bonds with interest coupons attached, commonly called coupon bonds; (2) bonds registered both as to principal and interest.

A bearer or coupon bond is payable to the bearer, the holder, the title passing by delivery. The Treasury Department does not require proof of ownership when such bonds are presented for payment or exchange.

A registered bond is payable only to its owner or his order, and can be transferred only by being properly indorsed and assigned by the owner.

against the particular bond indicated. The change in ownership of a registered bond is effected by the original payee indorsing and assigning the bond, using the form on the back thereof in accordance with the regulations of the Treasury Department.

When the owner of a registered bond disposes of it and has properly assigned it, it should be forwarded at once to the Secretary of the Treasury for transfer on the books of the Department.

The interest on registered bonds is paid by means of checks drawn by the Secretary of the Treasury on the Treasury of the United States, such checks being issued on the day interest is due.
