J. L. McEvoy ORGANIST C. H. STEVENS DELIGHTS BIG AUDIENCE. DEDICATION OF NEW ORGAN AT ARCADE DRAWS LARGE CROWD. The Arcade theatre was crowded to the doors last night long before the program which was to dedicate the new \$5000 organ began. Every seat was filled, every foot of available space was crowded and people lined the sidewalk waiting a chance to get in. Promptly at 7:15 Organist Charles H. Stevens opened his program and La Grande people were treated to the first real pipeorgan recital they have ever heard here. Keenly feeling the spirit of the occasion, Organist Stevens manipulated the keys with the technique and touch of a master and at the conclusion of the selection was rewarded by the enthusiastic applause of a thoroughly appreciative audience. Following a short musical program the picture, "Seven Keys to Baldpate," a rollicking five reel comedy, kept the crowd in amuse and supplemented by an excellently arranged and performed musical score proved a decided hit. Besides the regular program a last minute offering in the shape of two musical comedy stars, Angela May and Abbie Howard, who happened to arrive yesterday was also added to the bill. Their performance was high class and justified the management's efforts in securing them. J. L. McEvoy, musical manager of the show, was enthusiastic over the performance and the welcome accorded them. In speaking of the performance he said: "The girls were delighted with the appreciation of the audience and especially let me congratulate Mr. Stevens on his performance on the organ, I have worked with some of the best organists in the world, among them Clarence Eddy, the famous technician, and I never have heard an accompaniment played with more accuracy, feeling and technique than that played by Mr. Stevens last night.
