Anti-Patriotic Activity Threatens Red Cross Work

To the Editor:

It becomes my duty at this time to call the attention of the members of the Red Cross and all citizens of Union and Walla Walla Counties to the fact that there is danger of anti-patriotic propaganda being circulated innocently by members of the Red Cross.

The books of this chapter are open to the public and will be submitted for the inspection of any citizen who will apply to the secretary or the treasurer. Any information in the possession of any of the officers of the La Grande chapter will be freely imparted to anyone desiring same.

All members and citizens interested in the work of the Red Cross are urged to be present at the annual meeting for the election of officers at the City Hall at 7:30 P. M., on October 24, when the present officers will earnestly and sincerely endeavor to meet any statements or questions that may be brought before them.

Adverse criticism or questioning purposely or innocently circulated all lead to the same end: viz: the fostering of anti-patriotic sentiment and tend toward the undermining of the helpful machine which the American people are trying to build up to assist the country and for the maintenance of which each individual patriotic citizen is as responsible as every other.

If any one has any doubt about the working of the A. R. C. come to headquarters and state them. Anyone has a perfect right to do that and get whatever explanation may be offered. But let us not allow ourselves to play into the hands of the unpatriotic to our own undoing.

These remarks are not based upon any knowledge of local conditions of this sort but are prompted by the desire to prevent the occurrence of such conditions as are set forth in an official communication which has been received from headquarters and which I append hereto.

To all Chapters in the Northwestern Division:

It is very evident that the rumors and innuendoes calculated to embarrass the Red Cross, which are being industriously circulated throughout the country, are a part of an anti-patriotic propaganda. In so far as such statements or questions are merely efforts to obtain information, they should be earnestly and sincerely met.

However, many of the stories are utterly unwarranted and emanate simultaneously from too many different parts of the country to be purely accidental. Please officially advise all workers, as well as the local press and everyone with whom you come in contact, of the character of the movement which is on foot, and ask members and the public generally to proceed on the theory that no stories against the Red Cross should be believed until thoroughly investigated. Will you not send to this division

office a full account of all such rumors and criticisms being circulated, as well as a detailed statement of the source from which they come? Every criticism will be carefully investigated, and, if found to be justified, the cause for criticism will be removed, either in the Chapter, at Division Headquarters or at National Headquarters. In all cases, the Red Cross will bring the facts to the attention of persons interested.

It is very important that each local chapter should understand that the reputation and standing of the American Red Cross locally is in the hands of local officers and members, and that every criticism or innuendo against the Red Cross must be immediately challenged and followed up. The Red Cross is being run as an open book—it has no secrets. It is making a sincere effort to serve mankind and is doing it as carefully and economically as it knows how. Its accounts are to be audited by the War Department and the utmost effort is being made to give publicity to all its activities.

The earnest co-operation of each chapter in the Northwestern Division is requested in order that we may meet each and every situation promptly and effectively.

SCIENCE VS. WEIGHT IN SATURDAY'S GAME

O. A. C. AND IDAHO WILL PLAY
SCRAPPY CONTEST IN
PENDLETON.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Or., Oct. 17.—Speed, science and fight are the main reliance of the O. A. C. football camp in the possibility of victory over their heavy opponents from the University of Idaho at Pendleton next Saturday. Against this combination the Idaho aggregation comes strong with great weight, a longer training period and possibly some other points which will be sprung in the game.

Captain Neman is the only O. A. C. back that goes above 170 pounds. His back field averages about 160, while that of their opponents is said to weigh 175 pounds per man. The Idaho line far outweighs that of O. A. C.—probably averaging 190 pounds.

The team will reach Pendleton Saturday morning and take a light workout on the Roundup grounds to feel out the footing and get the play of light and shade as they will influence the game.
