CHAMPION OF WORLD WILL MEET O'NEIL

AD SANTEL WILL WRESTLE LOCAL ARTIST EARLY IN NOVEMBER.

Ad Santel, the present 175-pound wrestling champion of the world, will meet Jack O'Neil in a finish contest at the Arcade early in November.

Santel has a wonderful record as a wrestler, having met practically all the new wrestlers in the heavyweight and light-heavyweight class, the past two years. He does not draw the line at his own weight, but takes the big ones as they come and has met and defeated many big men the past year, including Managoff, the "Terrible Turk," Konstantine Roumanoff, the Russian; Michailoff, the Cossack; getting a draw with Strangler Ed Lewis, winning over Jess Westergard, Pete Visser, Aug Sepp, Nick Daviscourt, Gus Kervans and many other well-known big men, losing a match on February 22 this year, to Joe Stecher, world's heavyweight champion.

In an exhibition at Dreamland Rink, San Francisco, recently, he met 10 of the best wrestlers in the Bay vicinity, defeating the whole bunch in 50 minutes and 55 seconds. The array of wrestlers he defeated on that occasion included the best local talent from light-heavyweights up to Charlie Miller, the motorman weighting 40 pounds more than Santel. This was conceded by Frisco papers to be the most wonderful exhibition of wrestling ever witnessed in California.

The following story appeared in the San Francisco Examiner following his match with Jess Westergard.

"San Francisco will wait many moons before witnessing another wrestling match like last night's between Ad Santel and Jess Westergard, at Dreamland Rink. Without any exaggeration whatever, it was by far the greatest bout ever witnessed in the West. Many good bouts have been seen in San Francisco of late but they all fade away into insignificance when compared with the two-hour and 24-minute draw of February 29th between the hours of 9:44 and 12:38 P. M.

After the bout had passed the time limit, which is midnight, the police wanted to stop it, but were hooted from the ring. They had to obey orders, however, and just when things looked rosy for a finish match, a big sergeant stepped into the ring and ordered a halt.

As Santel and Westergard gained their feet, the latter appeared the weakest, but still capable of wrestling until a winner was established. Santel appeared just as fresh as ever and was working just as hard, if not more so, at the end as he was at the start, and Santel did more work last night than he ever did before in a match here.

Santel used everything in his repertoire, including the hold which used up Kervans, Managoff and others in hollow fashion. Westergard broke that hold without apparent effort. He is the strongest man to appear in a local ring since wrestling was revived.

Many were the times when both men were in tight holds; times when defeat seemed inevitable, and the fans wondered how they managed to escape without broken bones, as both men were exerting their tremendous strength whenever they had an advantage. Your wonderment increased upon realizing that Santel had not enough strength to pin Westergard, but you absolutely failed to understand why Westergard could not command enough strength to pin Santel.

The solution of the lack of falls naturally follows thusly: Santel is too clever for Westergard, whose strength and knowledge of the game combine to offset Santel's cleverness. It is doubtful if a return match would produce a winner. Sensation followed sensation but the big feature of the match was its cleanliness. If there was any bulldog work it escaped the notice of the crowd. Both men were in there to win on their merit, failing to employ one solitary unsportsmanlike tactic. As stated above Santel was working very fast as the bout neared its termination, and he came very close to pinning Westergard five minutes before the two-hour mark with an arm scissors. Westergard's arm was locked between Santel's legs and Ad was twisting that member for all he was worth. Westergard was suffering excruciating pain until he grabbed Santel's toe, forcing the German to seek another hold in order to save himself. Westergard's shoulders were on the verge of touching the mat several times before Santel would let go.

A few seconds afterwards Santel slammed a head scissors and toe hold on Jess but he finally worked his head free and Ad was forced to relinquish the toe hold. Many around the ring-side thought that Santel would have scored a fall had he exerted his strength instead of trying to force Westergard into submission by punishing him.

Westergard played his trump card after one hour and 30 minutes of wrestling. He got a head scissors from a perfect angle, then by allowing him full use of his arms and then forced Santel's shoulders down with a

hammerlock. Santel squirmed from side to side, one shoulder always a few inches from the mat and finally brought his wonderful legs into play. Westergard went right over the German's body, the smaller man coming up on top. Santel suffered from a bruised cauliflower ear, while Westergard's left wrist pained him considerably. Otherwise both were in fine shape at the end of the match. However, it is doubtful if either will be able to wrestle again for 10 days or 2 weeks, as the rigors of such a match play havoc with the ligaments throughout the entire body and therefore must be allowed to become normal again before they will stand another hard match.

The crowd was the largest that ever witnessed a wrestling match in San Francisco.
