

VON DER NOOT PRAISES
RED CROSS WORKERS

Washington, D. C., Oct. 22.—"American Red Cross workers in the little strip of Belgium still held from German clutches are constantly under shell fire. They are not thinking of winning medals—but of the good they can do," said Baron von der Noot de Moorsel, on a special mission from Belgium, during a visit to Red Cross headquarters here.

"I have seen personally many acts of heroism of the American Red Cross that have never come to public knowledge," said Baron Moorsel. "They are constantly under shell fire and in some sections of the Ypres sector within range of the rapid fire guns. They are working for humanity—not for personal honor."

Urging the American women to aid the Red Cross Baron Moorsel said, "It is the sacred duty of every American woman to give every hour she can spare to the Red Cross making bandages and other such labor as the local chapter directs."

MINESWEEPERS WILL BE
BUILT AT BREMERTON

Bremerton, Wash., Oct. 22.—Minesweepers—those sturdy little boats which brave death and destruction in the mine fields—will be built at the Puget Sound navy yards here, it is authoritatively reported today.

The government is facing a shortage of the craft, and construction is expected to be started immediately. The number which will be built cannot be made public.

Minesweepers are somewhat larger than the big government tugs and are equipped with machineguns and light guns.

IN FOOD CONSERVATION

Eugene, Ore., Oct. 22.—Every one of the nine women's fraternities in the University of Oregon is doing its bit in the Hoover food saving campaign. University girls are becoming accustomed to meatless and wheatless days, scant supplies of butter and a restricted allowance of sugar.
