newly tacked old carpet, together with four pistols one of which shot bullets corresponding to the bullet taken from the ankle of Mrs. Celia George, who was injured at the same time Eng was shot. An empty pistol just outside the room containing the trap door was found to shoot bullets corresponding to those taken from the body of Eng. Ah Sam and the two other Chinese were identified by local Chinese as being the ones across the street at the time of the shooting. These three have each been convicted of complicity in the murder and drawn life imprisonment.

A sixth man, accused with the others, is a Chinaman named Louie Moch, who went to trial this morning before Judge Knowles and a jury. This man was not found with the other five and the case against him is said to be considerably different.

None of the men convicted at this term have been taken to the penitentiary but it is probable that Sheriff Warnick will convey the prisoners to Salem early next week.

Judge Knowles has set down for trial October 29 the case of the State vs. Herbert Steel, charged with larceny of horses.

O. W. PLUMMER URGES STUDENTS TO SAVE FOOD

of the United States Food Army.

He spoke at all the schools today and delivered a wonderful message, telling the boys and girls how they might help win the war by eating less wheat bread and corn bread instead, less meat and more fish and chicken, less sugar. He didn't advise the boy and girls to starve themselves but to substitute other foods which are not so bitterly needed as butter, sugar, meat and white bread by the allies' armies and our own.

Mr. Plummer will speak at the motion picture theatres at the annual meeting of the Red Cross at the City Hall.

That the food campaign was vital to the success of the war was clearly pointed out by Mr. Plummer and he touched every heart when he brought home to his audience that the food saving might mean the lives of some of our own boys because by food saving America can help our Army bring the war to a speedier conclusion.

Mr. Plummer was accompanied by City Superintendent Hampton, Miss May Murphy, who spoke on health as conservation and the doctrine of the clean plate, and Clark Leiter, who told something of the career of Herbert Hoover.
