GERMAN NOT POPULAR IN OREGON SCHOOLS (United Press.) EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 24.—The war has just about wrecked the business of teaching German in Oregon. Dr. H. D. Sheldon, dean of the department of education of the University of Oregon, estimated today that approximately only half as many German teachers were engaged in Oregon schools this year as last.
