downs and makin another only to have the ball kicked from his arms, which was recovered by McClure, right tackle for La Grande, McDonald scoring one touchdown through the center of the lone on a line buck, Spencer substituting for Garrity during the last quarter scored on a delayed pass, making in all a total of seven touchdowns, which together with four goals kicked after the touchdowns made a total of 46 points.

One of the most pleasing features of the game in respect to the playing of the La Grande team was the performance of the line, which although minus the services of Captain Chenault played a bang up game throughout. The back field though did not come up to expectations of the coaches since they were slow in getting started, still slower in getting their plays off and fumbled several times, which, if they had been playing against a strong team would have resulted disastrously.

Three-quarters of the game was played in a snow storm which handicapped the forward passing to some extent, since the ball soon became wet and soggy. No particular player stood out above the rest, all the men playing more for team work.
